MRS. LYDICK'S LAND

Cass Lake, Minn., Oct. 29.—The work of surveying the allotment on section 16, adjoining the townsite of Cass Lake, which was recently secured by Mrs. Nellie Lydick and her children, has been completed.

Surveyor J. M. Campbell's plat of the newly-surveyed territory shows four blocks of eighteen lots each; eight blocks of twenty-four lots each; and four half blocks of twelve lots each, making a total of 312 twenty-five-foot lots.

The streets are laid out so as to parallel those of the townsite, so that if the territory is ever taken into the town of Cass Lake, there will be no irregular streets.

The survey shows that many of the buildings located on section 16 are in the street, facing an alley, or in some other ludicrous position.

It is understood there will soon be an overhauling and moving of the buildings upon the proper lots leased by the owners of the blocks.

An agreement had been reached between the representatives of Mrs. Lydick and the majority of the residents on the land, whereby a certain rental will be paid and the occupants given the use of the lots.

NEW MEN AT HEAD

Important Changes Made in the Management of the Horseshoe Mining Company.

Production of the Homestake for 1903 Will Exceed Five Millions of Dollars.

Deadwood, S. D., Oct. 29.—A change in the president of the Horseshoe Mining Company has taken place, and also in the board of directors. These are due, it is learned from an authoritative source, to the failure of the company to meet the payment of bond interest on Oct. 1.

It has been known for the last few days that matters of an important character regarding the control of this property were being discussed by the board of directors, which was meeting in Pittsburgh.

From there the board adjourned to Chicago, where the final readjustment was made and the new officers and directors have assumed control of the property.

The new management at this point of the property will go on as before, the management at the mines remaining unchanged. The new five-stamp mill at Terry is working regularly, and while the first clean-up was not satisfactory, due to the new tanks, reports from the mines indicate that the second clean-up has been close to what it was expected.

Mr. Woodworth is the new general manager of the Lexington Hill Gold Mining company. Mr. Woodworth has arrived from Denver and will make his headquarters at Deadwood, although he will not move his family from his present headquarters.

MEMONONIE, MICH.—The Northwestern Cedar's association met yesterday at Searanba and perfected the Shingle Manufacturers' association. They adopted new scale of wages to be effective Dec. 1, and say that if the men refuse to accept it the shingle mills will be closed down indefinitely.

A report of the amount of shingles manufactured by the members of the association this year showed 600,000,000 shingles and 200,000,000 still unshod. The wages being paid and the scale to which they will be reduced is as follows: Sawyers, double block, \$3.25 to \$3.50; sawyers, single block, \$2.75 to \$3.00; packers, \$2.25 to \$2.50; packers, 10 cents to 8 cents.
