# C. ERNST IN COURT A SHOELESS SNEAK

### The St. Paul Capitalist Is Charged with Embezzlement and Forgery.

### He Is Released Under Heavy Bail Pending Preliminary Hearing Nov. 12.

Casper Ernst of St. Paul, owner of the Ernst building on Wabasha street, capitalist, business man and promoter, was arrested yesterday. There was no complaint against Ernst by Rev. Father John B. Metzger of the Catholic diocese of Wisconsin. They charge him with embezzlement and forgery.

The embezzlement charge is that he appropriated to his own use \$200 entrusted to him by the complainant July 29. In return for this charge bail was fixed at \$1,500.

The forgery charge is that Mr. Ernst falsified certified, on July 21, 1903, that J. B. Metzger acknowledged the execution of a certain power of attorney, which instrument and the acknowledgment thereto were registered in the office of the register of deeds.

The alleged forged instrument sets forth that John B. Metzger assigned a mortgage made and executed by Silron Much and August Smith to Casper Ernst, Dec. 20, 1901, and registered on the same date, on lot 17, block 1, Krants addition, authorized Albert Mueller to receive the mortgage.

Mr. Ernst was represented by O. E. Holman, and pleaded not guilty to both charges.

Justice Lane declared it beyond his power to grant bail on the forgery charge, and Mr. Ernst was taken before a district court judge, who fixed it at \$3,000.

Bail was furnished on both charges and a preliminary hearing on both charges will be held in the municipal court Nov. 12.

### HATCHERY SITE BOUGHT

### Game and Fish Commission Starts Work on the Land Bought at Glenwood.

The state has purchased the ground for the Glenwood fish hatchery. The deeds have been executed at the agreement and approved by the attorney general. Executive Agent Fullerton, with D. W. Meeker of the game and fish commission were at Glenwood yesterday and put a crew at work clearing up the underbrush. A hatchery and a house for the superintendent will be built this fall, so that the hatchery can be put in service next spring.

### CONDITIONS IMPROVE

### Southern Minnesota Factories Pronounced in Good Shape.

Fifty cities in southern Minnesota have been visited by the state factory inspectors, and the results have been generally satisfactory. In fact, the O'Donnell. There were 1103 establishments visited, of which 105 were manufacturing plants. In all, 12,069 men, 12,229 women, 83 boys and 46 girls under 16. All these had certificates, and this child labor was found in the following: Sanitary conditions in the factories were found excellent. There were 564 night workers and 460 employes working Sunday.

### Further Inquiry into Hill's Case—Adjournment Is Due To-morrow.

Eight true bills were returned by the grand jury this morning. There are probably some men already indicted or men connected with deals on which bills have already been returned. Arraignments will be made to-morrow.

Following this morning's report the grand jury adjourned to meet to-morrow morning, at which time the report will be made and the jury discharged. This final report will be brief and will not hit at any particular persons against whom the present investigation may have divulged some evidence. There will be a brief resume of the municipal investigation, which it is claimed has been very well begun, but the report is not expected to be sensational. The evidence will be turned over to the incoming grand jury.

Additional attention has been given to former Police Captain Charles R. Hill by the present jury. This morning Otto Wirtensohn and Addie Mills, a well-known character, were called to the witness stand as witnesses. Questions put to them indicate that the grand jury is again looking into Hill's record. The reason, probably, lies in the fact that the present case against Hill is not regarded as strong.
