## EXPERT WHO KNEW

Harvey S. Chase Convinces Aldermen that He's the Man to Install Accounting System.

As a Result Committee Recommends the Bid of Jones, Caesar & Co.

Jones, Caesar & Co. of New York are recommended by the special committee on accounting reforms as the most capable firm for installing a new set of municipal books in Minneapolis. Four bids were presented to the committee yesterday and each bid was backed by more or less oral argument. The committee was greatly in doubt as to what should be done as the bids ranged from \$8,000 to \$14,000, and the employment of home talent was strongly urged. It was understood that Haskins & Sells had a clear field against all comers. This is the firm which installed the system in Chicago and it was backed by the business men of the city, such as George M. Gillette, W. L. Harris, S. A. Harvey, Fred S. Gray, E. Gillette, W. Y. Chute and President D. P. Jones of the city council.

It was a strong array of indorsements and the highest bid would have won had it not been for the presence of Harvey Chase, the famous Boston expert, now associated with Jones, Caesar & Co. He showed such complete mastery over the general field of municipal bookkeeping and such an intelligent conception of the weak points in Minneapolis, that when he had finished his remarks, Jones, Caesar & Co. had every vote on the committee except that of Alderman G. A. Westphal, who voted for Haskins & Sells.

Mr. Chase was closely questioned, but the more he was examined the more convincing was the belief that he was the man wanted for the work here. It was pointed out that with the late Mr. Haskins, installed the system in Chicago and he is more-ore the expert for the League of American Municipalities, the work of inaugurating systems of accounting. Should the contract be awarded to Jones, Caesar & Co., Mr. Chase will personally supervise the work in this city and issue various reports which will be so concise and intelligent that any business man can tell with almost a glance just what the various departments are doing. The specifications call for a complete and perfect system in all departments.

The four bids were as follows: C. A. Nimocks and F. H. Wendell, Minneapolis, \$8,000; Jones, Caesar & Co., New York, \$10,500; Baker-Vawter company, Chicago, \$10,800; Haskins & Sells, New York, \$14,000. Judge James H. Gillette, chairman of the committee, said that the bid of Messrs. Nimocks and Wendell, whose reputation as expert accountants was well known, but all the other citizens present objected to "home industry" in this case. For the reason that Chicago had gone away from home to get experts with no local connections, it was argued that Minneapolis should do it. The fact that the expense was of no consequence, for it was desired to establish the book-keeping on a substantial basis that would probably serve forever.

### BADLY CUT WITH RAZOR

Charles Leyman, Carved by Bert Clark, Sewed Up by Surgeons.

With sixty-three stitches in his face and head and suffering from weakness from loss of blood, Charles Leyman, 500 Plymouth avenue, the big of his home in a precarious condition. Bert Clark, his assailant, is locked up at the central police station, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, and will have a trial as soon as Leyman is able to appear in court.

The cutting affair, which came near ending fatally, occurred at Leyman's house last night. Clark claims that Leyman was paying attentions to his girl and for that reason he and the girl had trouble. Leyman heard Clark abusing the girl and interfered, when Clark drew a razor and attacked him.

Leyman received a 4-inch cut over the left eye, another of about the same size below the eye. His nose was split from its base to its tip, a long, deep gash on the chin was received, while there were one or two bad cuts in the abdomen. After the cutting had been done, which is said to have been stopped only by the breaking of Clark's razor, Leyman grabbed a cover from the stove and knocked his assailant down.

Patrolman Phillip Cohen, whose beat is near the Leyman residence, was summoned to the scene. A man to the city hospital, where the surgeons took sixty-three stitches in Leyman's wounds. He was very weak from the loss of blood, but it is thought that he will recover if no complications develop.

Clark, who says his true name is Hemrack, is a half-breed Indian and is employed as a printer. He has been engaged in printing programs. He admits doing the cutting, but says that it was done in self-defense to keep Leyman from doing a worse deed than he, from giving him a severe beating.

"Should he return to England, some one, no one can predict who, must be chosen to take his place."

Mrs. Jenkins having attended the famous Tucker training school in London. Brigadier Jenkins, now in Chicago attending the Tucker funeral, will return to conduct the services here Sunday.

## FREAK OF TAXATION

A Good House Near Lake Harriet Has Never Been Assessed.

Changes in Plats Made Its Site Part of a Street.

To live in an untaxed house is a luxury enjoyed by J. Arthur Ridgway of the park board. This enjoyment has not been long drawn out, as Mr. Ridgway has just bought the house, which will not be long continued, as things have happened which will permit the assessor to do what he has not been able to do for years—tax the property.

When Mr. Ridgway bought the house he could not understand the fresh-looking appearance of the place as compared with the worn look of its neighbors, which had been carrying municipal burdens for years. Nor could he comprehend the self references to the fact that he did not pay taxes.

It was found that a remarkable comedy of errors had been woven in the history of the dwelling and that it had been practically a house without any legal standing. This condition arose from the fact that the plat of this part of the city has been changed so often that the map shows a worn spot. Although the plat has been amended several times, the old plat, showing the house to be on lot 7, block 15, but legally it had no standing, as the plat never was filed.

Not long ago the David C. Bell investment in the family bought the land and replatted it as Lynnhurst addition. This totally changes the map and locates the famous elusive dwelling on lot 13, block 2.
