Mrs. Robert Burdette Condemned the Society Women in Round Terms.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—The "Smart set" is nothing but an excess on real society, said Mrs. Robert J. Burdette of Los Angeles, Cal., vice president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, in a scathing arraignment of the "four hundred" class to-day. Mrs. Burdette made an address before the Arche club at Grand Boulevard hall, Forty-seventh street and Grand Boulevard.

She declared that no such aggregation could ever be other than an insignificant factor in the life of a great nation.

"When asked to consider the society woman," said Mrs. Burdette, "a large proportion of the not over-thoughtful will hang on the eye line of the mental picture gallery the portrait of a creature, fair by nature, made radiant as a butterfly by all the arts of millinery and modiste, the possessor of a complexion warranted neither to blanch with fear or blush with shame, a figure as fearless as art can contrive it, and a waist line that changes with the season's whim; hands white and delicate, utterly unknown to useful service for self, let alone for others who need the warm pressure of a hand with heart blood in it.

"They gaze upon a chameleon-like creature that baffles recognition as she reflects the horse show, the ballroom, the street, the banquet hall, the boudoir, the automobile, as a creature that is all things to all men and nothing to any man. The picture is not a smile with the uplifted eyebrow and the ambition of this mental creature is not to please, but to amuse, so she dances in charity balls and despises the object of charity for which it is given.

"She is a creature whose favorite companions of what is called the temper sex are insipid and brainless creatures who are called men only because they are not women. She is a woman whose whole life is one of questionable gaiety, who smokes at dinners with men who drink rather too much at times. The announcement of her engagement brings her divorce suit as accepted as a matter of course."
