NELSON BOYS PLEA FOR LIFE

Case of the Owatonna Murderers Comes Before the Supreme Court.

Emphasis Laid on Judge Buckham's Refusal to Grant Change of Venue.

Attorneys for the Nelson boys of Owatonna, under sentence of death for the murder of Henry Krier, made a vigorous plea for a new trial before the supreme court this morning. Samuel Lord, of Kasson, and Harlan E. Leach, of Owatonna, presented the case. They made a strong point of the refusal of Judge Buckham to grant a change of venue, urging that in the inflamed state of public sentiment the boys did not get a fair trial in Owatonna. The testimony of Sutherland and the girls, Jasper and Silsco, was also pulled to pieces, and shown to be conflicting.

The state was represented by S. T. Littleton, the county attorney, and W. F. Sawyer, attorney general. Douglas assisted them in an advisory capacity.

DO THEY RAIN DOWN?

Prof. Nachtrieb Says Worms May, but More Frequently They Crawl Up.

The Old Question Revived by a Letter from a Perplexed Observer.

Angle worms just rain down, says Nellie B. of Redfield, S. D., in a letter to the Minneapolis Journal. Angle worms crawl up, says Henry F. Nachtrieb, professor of zoology at the state university. Yet if the angle worms did rain down, indeed, Nellie B., whose name is something else, how for mercy sakes alive, how did they possibly get into the soil?

It happened this way, writes Miss Nellie: "I lived in Amboy, Wash., a year, and it rained about nine months out of that year. And many is the time I have set a pail or dishpan out in the yard while it was raining, and before that pail was full of water there would be half a dozen or so angle worms in it. And there was not a thing near that they could crawl or fall off from into the pail."

"Now, where did they come from, and how did they get into the pail? It's a great puzzle to me; yet this is what I have seen with my own eyes, and they say seeing is believing. Besides, my aunt, who has always lived in Washington, believes they rain down."

Mrs. Nellie admits, however, that her mother does not agree with her and the aunt as to the origin of earth worms.

Professor Nachtrieb takes a judicious stand halfway between mama and auntie. Says he: "Sometimes angle worms rain down, as her aunt believes, and sometimes they crawl up, as her mother insists. When a tornado comes along and scoops up the contents of a pool of water, the wind may carry away angle worms or tadpoles or fish, or anything else that happens to be in the water, just as a tornado may pick up a man if he is standing about carelessly. Angle worms, being lighter than the mud, may be carried farther, and may seem to 'rain down' in another country."

"Still, tornadoes are so rare in Washington that I should say, begging Miss Nellie's pardon, that her charming eyes deceived her, and that the angle worms, which are really skilful climbers, climbed up from the earth into the pail or dishpan. These worms are born of eggs in the earth and they seldom try to fly."

ISSUE A GRAVE ONE

Merger Motion Now Pending Is More Important Than at First Supposed.

The Whole Question of Jurisdiction Has Been Raised by the Defense.

More depends on the motion now pending before the supreme court in the state's merger case than at first appeared.

The whole question of jurisdiction is raised by the defense, which objected to an early hearing of the case, and gave notice that it would move the dismissal of the appeal on the ground that it does not come properly before the supreme court. The rule requires that three weeks' notice of such a motion be given, but the merger attorneys have brought it up in this way without any notice at all.

If the supreme court refuses to take jurisdiction in the case, it will be on the ground that no constitutional question is involved. If a constitutional question is not involved, then the state attorneys have brought it up in the wrong way. The first paragraph of Article IV of the federal constitution says: "Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state." Counsel for the state in the merger case claim that under this guarantee the laws of Minnesota cannot be broken by a conspiracy formed in another state. Under this clause the constitution they base their appeal to the supreme court, which only takes jurisdiction where constitutional questions are involved.

If the supreme court decides that no constitutional question is involved, that will end the state's case so far as enforcement of the state anti-merger laws is concerned. The state can only bring the case before the circuit court of appeals on the ground that the state has a right to prevent the violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. The merger counsel will, of course, deny this right, and it may also be refused by the court on the ground that the federal government has already brought a suit on the same grounds. But if the court of appeals does take jurisdiction, the chances of the state will be bright, as the same court has already decided that the merger is a violation of the anti-trust act.

Counsel for the state believe that the supreme court has jurisdiction in the case, and that the state has a right somewhere to prevent the violation of state laws by a foreign corporation. The brief wired to Washington so states, and a favorable decision from the court is hoped for next week.

HINT OF A CORNER

A. I. Valentine, Chicago Grain Man, Associated with Armour, Visits on 'Change.

Report that He Is Buying Cash Wheat for Delivery in Chicago.

A. I. Valentine and C. H. Regua, two leaders in the Chicago wheat pit, were on 'change this morning, as guests of Frank Commey, vice president of the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce.

Some time ago rumor had it that the big Armour firm was making heavy purchases of cash wheat in the west and in Minneapolis for shipment to Chicago, which were thought to be for the purpose of giving the Armour's enough contract wheat to control the situation. These rumors were revived to-day by the bulls and helped firm up the wheat market a little.

COME HERE TO HUNT

Non-resident Sportsmen Take Out Many Big Game Licenses.

Non-resident hunters are swarming to the office of the game and fish commission and paying \$25 each for the privilege of hunting big game in Minnesota. The season opens on Monday, and over a hundred hunters from other states have already secured the license with the three coupons, entitling them to ship the animals they kill. Minnesota hunters pay \$1 for a license, which can be obtained from any county auditor. There were 225 small game licenses issued to non-residents in the past season. The \$5,000 has been collected from outsiders for the use of the game and fish commission in protecting the game of the state.

TO LIST TUBERCULOSIS AT THE DEWEY TO-MORROW

Secretary Bracken Favors the New York Plan of Supervision.

Dr. H. M. Bracken, secretary of the state board of health, is in favor of applying the New York plan to Minnesota and requiring all cases of tuberculosis to be reported to the state authorities. No quarantine is enforced, but he will be able to keep track of cases and see that proper sanitary precautions are taken. New York also has free dispensary preparation of tuberculin, and tuberculosis patients. Incipient cases can be sent to sanatoriums and cured entirely.
