Normannaheimen PALM FOR SCULPTOR

America's Tribute to Man Who Made Washington Statue of Sherman.

Service Beside Grave of Carl Rohl-Smith When Statue Was Unveiled.

At the same hour that the elaborate ceremonies attending the unveiling of the Sherman statue were held in Washington a simple but touching ceremony was held at Vestre churchyard, Copenhagen, at the grave of Carl Rohl-Smith, the sculptor who designed the Sherman statue. On the suggestion of Secretary Hay the United States minister to Denmark, Laurits S. Swenson, laid a wreath on the grave of the sculptor as a token of remembrance for his splendid work on the Sherman monument. The wreath was a beautiful design in palm leaves tied with silk ribbons in the American and Danish colors, and it bore the inscription: "Grateful Tribute from Sherman Statue Commission and Others, Oct. 15, 1903."

Minister Swenson had invited Professor Stephan Sinding and General C. T. Christensen, both intimate friends of Mr. Rohl-Smith, to attend the exercises. Professor Sinding modeled several of the allegorical groups for the monument and rendered valuable assistance in completing the whole work after the death of his friend. General Christensen was related to the sculptor and a lifelong friend of General Sherman from the time they saw service in the civil war until the latter's death. Remarks were made at the grave by Minister Swenson, Professor Sinding and General Christensen.

Paper from Cornstalks.
Dr. Viggo Drensen of Brooklyn, a member of the well-known Drensen family of paper-makers in Norway, is reported to have invented a process of making paper out of cornstalks and the finest of parchment paper of the pulp. Those who have watched the results of his experiments at Warren & Co.'s mills in Maine say that the invention marks another epoch in the history of paper-making. North America uses about two and a half million tons of paper annually. It is estimated that seven states alone will yield 50,000,000 tons of cornstalks suitable for paper-making after every harvest.

MODEL GOES TO NORWAY
Fjelde's Model of Ole Bull Statue Sent to Fjelde's Birthplace.
The model for Jakob Fjelde's statue of Ole Bull in Loring park, Minneapolis, has been presented to the city of Aalesund, Norway, by the sculptor's widow, Mrs. Margrethe Fjelde. Aalesund was Jakob Fjelde's birthplace from which he wandered out as a lad of 17 to make a name as a sculptor. He returned only for occasional visits he always cherished the memory of the old town.

The presentation of the Ole Bull model, which took place Sunday, Oct. 11, was recognized as an event of importance and the leading newspaper of the place, Aalesund's Handels og Søfarts Tidende, gave two whole pages to an account of the exercises. The statue was presented by Dr. Herman Fjelde of Abercrombie, N. D., a brother of the sculptor, and Claudine Fjelde, attired as Columbia, unveiled the statue after an eloquent address by School Inspector Gjessing. Mr. Aarflot delivered an address on the life and work of Jakob Fjelde.

A WORK OF NOTE
Shown by Svend Svendsen at Pittsburg Exhibition.

Svend Svendsen, the Chicago artist, has again painted something which has attracted attention. EXILED FROM FINLAND
Two Men of That Oppressed Country Seek Homes in America.

Axel Wahren, formerly a wealthy land owner in Finland, now an exile from his native land by order of the Czar of Russia, arrived the other day in Kansas City, accompanied by Professor Ernst Rindell, another Finnishlander, who is his close friend. Mr. Wahren and Professor Rindell are on their way to seek new homes in Oklahoma or some other part of the southwest. Mr. Wahren was banished from Finland three weeks ago with forty-one other citizens of that country. Finland is Russian territory, but until recently it has been permitted by the czar to maintain its own army and navy and to have its own parliament. Recently, however, the czar has decided to curtail Finland's governmental rights to place that little country almost directly under the absolute power of the crown. Mr. Wahren and some of the other forty-one Finnishlanders banished from their country were members of the Finnish parliament. Their offense was speaking against the plans of the czar, which were not looked on with favor in Finland.

FACTS ABOUT AMERICA
Contained in a New Book for Scandinavians at Home.

Carl Fischer-Hansen, L. L. B., is the author of a book "Om Amerika." It comes from the New York publishing house of Brentano, which shows its ability to publish as creditable works in Danish-Norwegian as in English. Mr. Fischer-Hansen is a gifted young Danish attorney, who has married into a New York millionaire's family. He is very popular among the Scandinavian-Americans in the metropolis. His work "Om Amerika" (About America) is to some extent a condensed encyclopedia of the United States. For those in Scandinavia desiring information of the conditions in the United States the book will prove exceedingly valuable.

NEWSPAPERS CONSOLIDATE.
"Svithlod" of Des Moines, Is Absorbed by Minneapolis Paper.

Svenska Folkets Tidning of this city, the oldest Swedish paper in the northwest, has bought the plant and subscription list of "Svithlod," the oldest and most influential Swedish newspaper in Iowa. "Svithlod" has been in existence for twenty-one years and has been credited with a circulation of 10,000. Manager Karl Ekman says that all the subscribers

of the "Svithlod" will begin receiving Svenska Folkets Tidning with the next issue. The latter paper is making great strides and is recognized as one of the strongest of Swedish weeklies, numbering on its editorial staff some of the brightest of Swedish writers.

THE NORTHERN LION

A Lecture on Gustavus Adolphus by Rev. David Holmgren.
Rev. David Holmgren, will give his lecture on Gustavus Adolphus, the hero king of Sweden, at the St. Ansgarius Swedish Episcopal church this evening. Unlike a great many of the educated Swedes who come over here simply for amusement or for sight-seeing, Mr. Holmgren is refreshingly frank in comparing the conditions in Sweden and America. After seeing the prosperity attained by thousands of sons and daughters of Sweden who have emigrated to the United States, he does not hesitatingly say that they did right and that others in Sweden should do likewise, for America is the country of unlimited opportunity.

Mr. Holmgren is a leading preacher and an influential member of the Swedish riksdag or national parliament.

Fishermen Are Lost.
Torje Viken, a fishing steamer from Aalesund, went to the bottom last month, taking with it thirteen men, ten who lived at Aalesund and three who lived at Bergund. Nine were married and left widows and from four to seven children in straitened circumstances, and the other four were the sole support of aged parents. A sum of 1,100 kroner for the relief of the destitute people was raised at the Jakob Fjelde memorial exercises, at which the Ole Bull statue was unveiled.

Seland's Next Outbreak.
Hans Seland's next public appearance in Minneapolis will be next Tuesday evening, Nov. 10, at I. O. O. F. hall, Central avenue and Fourth street. Seland is the best story-teller that Norway has sent to the United States. Some of his tales are old, but are all the better for that, for the dialect employed by Seland and the significant manner he has for giving point to his tales make the old stories as interesting as the new ones.

Sweden's New Fortifications.
Several of the coast defenses on which Sweden has been working for several years have recently been completed, among them the fortifications at Vaxholm, Oscar-Fredriksholm, Karlskrona, Paarsund and Gothenburg. Several others are nearing completion. Batteries of heavy coast artillery are also being established at Vaxholm, Karlskrona and other places.

Changes in Swedish Ministry.
It is reported that Minister Vestring will soon resign from the Swedish ministry in order to accept a place on the supreme bench, which Judge Nohberg will vacate. Governor Holmquist of Faum is named as a possible successor to Minister Vestring.

Danish Reforms.
The Danish government is preparing a bill for universal suffrage in municipal matters for introduction in the riksdag. The bill likewise provides for the secret ballot. In the main the proposition is the same as that introduced in former riksdags by the liberals.

Professor Lottfield Returns.
Mr. and Mrs. G. Lottfield, who have been absent from the city for two years, have returned. Both have been added to the faculty of the Minnesota Normal School and Business College, Fifth avenue S. and Twenty-fourth street, of which Mr. Lottfield was president until compelled to give up the work on account of ill-health.

A Slate Mine.
Deposits of slate exist in large quantities in Norway, but very little attention has been paid to it. Last summer the quarries in Voss sent a small cargo to Scotland, which resulted in an order for two shiploads at once. A large order has also been received from Denmark.

Unfurl a Banner.
Nordlyset Lodge No. 13, Sons of Norway, will unfurl its new banner Saturday evening, Nov. 14, at Union Temple, 26-28 Washington avenue S. The banner, which has been embroidered by the Fjelde sisters, is one of the handsomest ever seen in this city. An address will be made by Hans Seland, the Norwegian author.

Drachmann Improving.
Holger Drachmann, the Danish artist and author, celebrated his fifty-seventh birthday on Oct. 9. He is rapidly improving in health and the physicians expect that he will entirely recover from the nervous prostration which has afflicted him for some time.

AFTER MOUNTAIN LIONS

President Roosevelt Said to Be Planning Another Trip to Western Colorado.

Denver, Col., Nov. 6.—John B. Goff, the veteran guide who accompanied the president on his famous Colorado lion hunt, recently wrote Mr. Roosevelt that the mountain lions and other predatory animals are being killed off rapidly, and urging him to come out for a hunt before they are exterminated. Goff received a prompt response from the president, the contents of which he refused to divulge, but the fact that he is gathering up all the crack dogs of western Colorado and putting his hunting camp in apple pie order indicates that the president will join him for a lion hunt during the holiday recess of congress.

A SNOW COVERED PLATEAU

Is the Territory Unmarked by Alaskan Boundary Award.
From The Journal Bureau, Colorado Building, Washington, Nov. 6.—Former Senator Turner, discussing the work of the Alaska

boundary commission, says that the fact that no award was made for a part of the line is unimportant, and that it will make no difference to either country if that portion of the boundary is not marked for fifty or a hundred years. To provide for the future, however, the commission laid down a principle by which the line could be defined, should that become necessary.

The commission did not mark the line because no adequate surveys are in existence by which the predominant mountain chain could be ascertained. Most of the territory, which is between Jake's Needle and Devil's Thumb, is a wild plateau where the snow rarely melts, and its only possible value is for minerals.

TO FIGHT THE TRUST

Independent Cigar Dealers Plan to Raise Campaign Fund.
Chicago, Nov. 6.—The independent cigar dealers of the country have adopted a plan to secure \$200,000 a year with which to fight the trust. This plan will remain in effect until the independent dealers have accomplished some results. The money will be raised by selling cigars to the dealers to be placed on all goods sold.
