### RAILROADS. NO \$1 COAL RATE

Rock Island Doesn't Think Burlington Will "Butt In" in the Northwest.

The R. I. Is Leader in Illinois Fields and Is Expected to Control.

Special to The Journal. New York, Nov. 18.—The announcement that the Burlington will reduce rates on coal from the Illinois coal fields to the twin cities is not taken seriously by officials of the Rock Island or the Frisco. These people say that the Burlington has not a sufficiently strong position in the coal fields of Illinois to make it a great factor in this growing trade. The Rock Island says that thru its ownership of the Eastern Illinois and the Evansville & Terre Haute, it has this trade pretty much at its mercy. It undoubtedly possesses thru these railroads by far the strongest coal resources of any railroad in that territory, and it proposes to use these resources to their utmost in an effort to create a very much wider market for the Illinois grades of coal in the northwest. The Burlington is not likely to interfere seriously with this plan. Even if it were in a position to do so, the Burlington would not make enough on the Northern Pacific system, stopping at division points. The last trip of the latter car was made three years ago. When Minneapolis was reached the agents found two coats scarcely enough. The agents had a good time, and the twin city car load furnished most of the amusement for the other passenger train.

### DEPEW QUITS DIRECTORATE

Retirement from N. Y. N. H. & H. a Step in That Direction. New York, Nov. 18.—The retirement of Chauncey M. Depew from the directorate of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railway is said to be the first step on his part to withdraw from the large number of corporations of which he is a director so as to curtail his business responsibilities and duties. Mr. Depew represented the Vanderbilt interests in the New Haven road for many years. For some time past he has taken little part in the management of the New York Central.

### PUSHING THINGS IN OMAHA

Great Western Is Clearing Buildings of Terminal Site. The Great Western engineers will have the ground at Omaha ready for excavation in six weeks. Eighty houses stand on the new terminal site and thirty-day notice has been served for their removal. Engineer L. F. Wakefield expects to have a good deal of grading done before frost comes.

### THE OMAHA ROAD WILL ENDEAVOR TO GIVE ST. PAUL AS GOOD A TICKET OFFICE AS IT ESTABLISHED IN MINNEAPOLIS A YEAR AGO.

The present situation will be abandoned for the Omaha street corner in the Ryan Hotel, considered the best corner for the purpose in the city. The move will be made Jan. 1. The office will be fitted in a temporary structure. The Great Western will move to Robert between Fifth and Sixth street. The quarters occupied by the Rock Island have been leased for a store and the company will have to look elsewhere.

### BETTER FOR RIVER MARKETS.

Missouri river live stock markets will profit by the abolition of return passes to live stock shippers. The prospect of a round trip to Chicago induced many live stock men to go into the car lots of stock which would sell as profitably at the river. The western market people used every effort to have the railroads establish the rule which is now effective.

### RATES GO UP DEC. 31.

Freight rates east of Buffalo will remain the same until Dec. 31, after which they will be advanced to the figures prevailing before Sept. 1. This is because of the new rates, already effective, which mean an advance of a cent a bushel on wheat, corn, oats and barley.

### NAVIGATION BLOCKED

Mouth of the Detroit River Closed by a Wreck. Amherstburg, Ont., Nov. 18.—Navigation at the mouth of the Detroit river is completely blocked. The big steel steamer W. L. Brown, laden with iron ore, went on the rocks at the entry to Lake Erie on Monday night. Yesterday morning the steamer S. S. Currie attempted to pass the Brown, but was stopped by the strong current directly across the channel. Wreckers are at work removing the cargoes of the steamers, but it will be two or three days before either of them is released.
