GOOD AS REAL GAME

Football Show at International Aud-
 itorium Battle Ever Seen
 as Actual Contest.

Most Elaborate Reproduction of a
 ridoron Battle Ever Seen
 in the Country.

The advance sale of tickets for the
 great football show to be given at the
 International auditorium, Thanksgiving
 Day, under the direction of the
 Journal and the Minnesota Daily, in-
 dicates that an immense crowd will
 be present to see and hear the re-
 turns from the Wisconsin-Minnesota
 game at Madison. The conflict be-
 tween patriotism and the desire for
 physical comfort is happily settled
 by means of this show, the weather
 is too cold for even the most enthu-
 siastic rooter to find much pleasure in
 standing in the open air watching a
 bulletin service, but at the auditorium
 the lovers of the game will be enabled
 to see even more graphic bulletins
 while seated in a warm, comfortable
 hall.
 The entertainment will include
 many features of interest, aside from
 the reproduction of the game, which
 will be on the most elaborate scale
 ever attempted in the country. A
 Misses' Glee will be the main feature
 of the football field at Madison to the au-
 ditorium, and a Journal staff con-
 cert will send the details of con-
 siderable interest as it is completed.
 So complete is the code which has
 been arranged, that every movement
 of the ball, both as regards its pro-
 gress from one end of the field to
 the other, and as regards its movement
 from side to side, will be reproduced
 on the canvas field at the auditorium.
 It will be the most complete and
 graphic reproduction of a football
 game ever seen in the country.

Biography of Harvard Game

Besides the reproduction of the
 Minnesota-Wisconsin game, the spec-
 tators will be treated to an exhibition
 of the kineoscope pictures of the
 Harvard-Pennsylvania game, Nov. 7.
 This is said to be the longest film ever
 used in a kineoscope, and it is the
 only successful reproduction of a
 football game in this manner. The
 pictures are remarkably clear and
 distinct, and it is hard for the spec-
 tator to realize that he is not watch-
 ing the game itself.
 The Journal Newsboys' band will be
 in attendance, and will render popu-
 lar and classical numbers during the
 progress of the game. The rooting
 is expected to be a feature of the en-
 tertainment. The university girls'
 Rooters club is expected to be present
 in a body, and those of the men's
 rooters club who do not take the trip
 to Madison will be present also; and
 will be led by the university cheer
 and songs by the regular yell captains.
 The entertainment is for the benefit
 of the students' fund, a handsome sum
 will be realized. Tickets are now
 on sale at the Journal office, and at
 the University book store, and the
 Journal's book store. The game will
 begin at 1:45, and the bulletins will
 begin to arrive within two or three
 minutes after the referee blows his
 whistle for the kickoff. The doors will
 be opened at 1 p. m.

GRUEL "CONS" DID IT

They Kept Young Men of City From
 Calling on Robbinsdale
 Maidens.

It Was Done by Assessing Those Re-
 turning Late One Dollar
 Each.

Robbinsdale has been freed from a
 gentlemanly form of hold-up and
 again the girls of this suburb are popu-
 lar among Minneapolis men. In-
 fact the record for the last year of
 thirteen marriages in that suburb
 may be duplicated.
 The young women could not under-
 stand why the men of the city were
 so loth to call often, or to accept in-
 vitations for rural functions. The
 explanation came thus:
 The daughter of a Robbinsdale resi-
 dent was being escorted home by a
 young man not familiar with the ways
 of the Robbinsdale street car exten-
 sion. The young man, tho usually
 well supplied with car fare, was a bit
 dazed when the conductor of the Rob-
 binsdale car, outdared bound, with
 great consideration, warned him
 that if he was coming back that night
 it would cost him a dollar. A dollar
 was not to prevent the young man's
 doing his full duty as escort, how-
 ever, and he paid the fare and took
 the last car out.
 But the miss, a high school friend
 of the youth, was not willing to see
 him thus parted from his money, and
 spoke of the matter to her parents.
 The matter came to the ears of the
 proprietor of the Robbinsdale line and
 an investigation showed that a gen-
 tlemanly hold-up system was being
 practiced on the line and had been
 going on for three years. The young
 man got his dollar back and certain
 employees were replaced, and there
 was a change in the social life at
 Robbinsdale, young men from the
 city finding it a most attractive place
 and easy and inexpensive of access.
 But the new conductors soon recog-
 nized their opportunities, and a short
 time ago fifteen young men were
 asked to pay as many dollars for be-
 ing carried back to the city.
