NEW NIC. AVE. BLDG.
Warner Corner on Fourth and Nicollet Will Probably Be Greatly Improved Soon.
The Lower Floor of New Structure Will Be Used for Stores.

Immediately following the remodeling of the Wetherby building at Fourth and Nicollet, now about ready for occupancy, comes the report that the Warner estate, which owns the property across Fourth street from the Wetherby building, with forty-two feet frontage on Nicollet and running back to the Swedish American bank, contemplates building on the corner. Tentative plans are being drawn, and if negotiations in progress are carried thru, it is believed that the old three-story brick building will be razed to make room for a modern store and office building.

The original owner of the building, Mr. Warner, Sr., had contemplated the building a sort of monument to himself in a magnificent office building. The plans were not carried out immediately and Mr. Warner's death came very soon, being followed by that of a son. A remaining son, who lives in New York, and who is now in the city, has charge of the new building.

BIG SHOW OF FRUIT
Display at Next Week's Horticultural Meeting Due to Break Records.
Sessions Will Be Held at First Unitarian Church—The Public Invited.

The thirty-seventh annual meeting of the Minnesota State Horticultural society will be held next week from Tuesday to Friday inclusive, in the audience-room of the First Unitarian church, Eighth street and Mary place. The usual exhibit of fruit will be made yesterday, inspected various proposed routes for a cross-town line in St. Paul and other extensions. Dale street, Victoria street, Lexington avenue and Snelling avenue have been suggested with the majority apparently favoring Snelling. Such a line would connect W. CHARTERED CAR RATES
Charged on Robbinsdale Line After Regular Hours.
A. B. Robbins, proprietor of the Robbinsdale car line, writes that any extra charges made by the conductors of the line are practically for chartered cars and are made only after regular hours. The last car leaves Robbinsdale at 11:30 p. m. and returns to Robbinsdale at 12 p. m. Sometimes persons wish to remain in the suburb later than 11:30 and make special arrangements with conductors. Mr. Robbins wishes to give every reasonable facility for later trips, and therefore, permits the conductors to make the runs when requested to do so. No extra charge in the regular hours is made with Mr. Robbins' knowledge.

FINE COWS DISEASED
The Aristocratic Mowbray Herd Is Almost Wiped Out.
A. W. Mowbray of St. James, president of the State Dairymen's association, has been hard hit by the inspection of the dairy cattle now carried on by the live stock sanitary board. A recent test of the herd resulted in condemning twenty out of every six fine dairy cows for tuberculosis. There were no outward signs of the disease and the result of the test occasioned considerable surprise, as the Mowbray herd has been considered a model.

POISON IN BRANDY
Saloon Men Didn't Know It Contained Salylic Acid.
Ed. Orbeck, 427 Cedar avenue, and J. Faherty were arrested in police court this morning charged with selling liquors containing a large amount of salylic acid. Both pleaded guilty but said that they had purchased it for good brandy at the wholesalers. They refused to give the names of the wholesalers because they were afraid of losing their business. This is the sixth case of the arrest of saloon keepers for selling adulterated goods when the wholesaler was really at fault.

UNCLE SAM BUYS A GOLD BRICK.
