FAVORS TAFT

Roosevelt Said to Want Him on the Republican Ticket.

Washington, Nov. 30.—President Roosevelt is said to favor Governor William H. Taft for the vice presidential nomination and his Ohio friends are somewhat perturbed at the prospect.

They prefer that Governor Taft should await the time when he can be a candidate for president in his own right.

Governor Taft will become the secretary of war next January, and as a prominent member of the president's cabinet he will be more conspicuously in the public eye than at present. His ambition generally is understood to be the supreme court of the United States, and it has been currently believed that when he was drafted by President McKinley to fill the arduous duties of head of the Philippine commission, it was with the tacit understanding that he would go to the supreme court later.

WHOLE CITY IS FEVER STRICKEN

Butler, Penn., Has Had 1,550 Cases of Typhoid Since Middle of September.

Deaths Have Exceeded a Score—Physicians, Weakened by Over-Work, Themselves Are Ill.

Butler, Pa., Nov. 30.—This town is now thoroughly organized and in charge of a general relief committee to wrestle with the conditions that have arisen thru the epidemic of typhoid which developed on Sept. 15, and which, so far, has resulted in twenty-eight deaths, while 1,550 persons have been stricken. Three deaths occurred yesterday and new cases are being constantly reported.

One doctor has sixty-five fever patients and cannot attend to all. Dr. James Crossman broke down under the strain yesterday and to-day has typhoid fever. Four doctors are now sick, the others being Drs. Winter, Harris and McAdoo.

Nearly \$48,000 was raised at the town meeting on Saturday, but it is not expected that the scourge will subside until spring and the expenses of the relief committee will amount to about \$1,000 a week.

Responses to appeals for aid in the way of nurses and money have been prompt and liberal. Ten nurses came yesterday from Pittsburgh and more are to follow. Offers of nurses from Newcastle and Cleveland and financial aid from Philadelphia and Pittsburgh have been accepted by the committee. Nurses from outside towns will be required to bring credentials from their hospitals.

All druggists in the city will fill prescriptions at cost and the undertaker have tendered the use of their ambulances free. Temporary hospitals have been established and they are rapidly being filled up with patients.

DRAKE'S WILL IS FOUND

University Founded by and Named For Him Gets a Bequest of \$50,000.

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 30.—The missing will of the late Governor Francis M. Drake was found last night among the papers in the office of the Des Moines attorney, Scottish Rite Masons, of which order he was a member. It was forwarded at once by registered letter to Centerville for probate.

By its terms the six children, including Millie D. Shotts, Jennie Sawyers, Eva B. Goss, F. E. Drake, John A. Drake and Mary Lord Sturdevant share equally and \$50,000 goes to Drake university.

The instrument was drawn Jan. 26, 1897, and was given to Grand Recorder Coleman for safe-keeping. The latter thought a later will had been made and gave the instrument no thought during the fruitless search for it at Centerville.

LAKELAND DUCK CASE

Defendants Convicted at Jackson—Sentence Deferred and an Appeal to Be Taken.

Jackson, Minn., Nov. 30.—The jury in the Lakeland duck case returned a verdict of guilty. At the request of T. J. Knox, the attorney for the defendants, the sentence was withheld until Feb. 2. The case will be appealed without delay.

The defendants were William Kerr and an employe, Robert Poole, and they were charged with being implicated in the attempt to smuggle game birds to the Chicago market. The case was prosecuted at the instance of the state fish and game commission.

F. Fullerton, state game warden, says the conviction of the defendant strikes right at the head of an organized band of pot hunters equal to the moonshiners of the Tennessee mountains. They were convicted of having 2,000 birds in their possession, and under the law the fine is \$10 a bird, which means a fine of \$20,000.

While this seems excessive, there are decisions to sustain it, a fine of over \$200,000 having been held valid in New York.

PARKER SILENT

The Judge Won't Talk Politics While on the Bench.

Esopus, N. Y., Nov. 30.—Chief Justice Alton B. Parker of the New York court of appeals has made a statement to a reporter for the Esopus Eagle which is taken by his friends to be tantamount to a declaration that he would not accept a nomination for the presidency from a division of the Democratic wing of Mr. Cleveland's letter and the Brooklyn Eagle's advocacy of himself were shown him, Judge Parker said.

These matters are interesting. I cannot, however, comment on any relations to any political candidacy in which I may be placed by others or talk of politics at all. I shall have nothing whatever to say on political subjects, personal or general, while holding a judicial position.
