CITY NEWS.

FINE SHOW OF FRUIT
Display by the Horticultural Society This Year Breaks All Records.

The \$1,000 Prize for the Best Seedling Brings Out Many Entries.

The 1,200 plates of apples in the fruit exhibit displayed at the First Unitarian church, Eighth street and Mary place, in connection with the annual meeting of the State Horticultural society, constitutes the largest exhibit that the society has yet prepared.

Much attention was given by visitors yesterday to the 100 varieties of seedling apples that secured the first Wilder medal when exhibited a few months ago at the Boston meeting of the American Pomological society.

The biggest individual exhibit in the local display is that of the Jewell Nursery company of Lake City. Other prominent exhibitors are W. L. Parker, D. S. Day and D. K. Alken of Farmington; P. H. Perry of Excelsior; Thomas Reddy of Waukegan; J. R. Cummins of Eden Prairie, and S. H. Kenny of Morristown. Mr. Day has succeeded notably with his Day No. 2, an apple that keeps for two years. Admirable seedlings grown as far north as Aitkin county are exhibited by O. S. Hazelton.

The productivity of Minnesota orchards is manifested on two tables, one of which shows twenty-five varieties of early winter apples, and the other seventy-five varieties of late winter apples.

Several excellent entries of seedlings have come from Wisconsin, the fruit display having been opened this year for the first time by theologists in western Wisconsin, northern Iowa, South Dakota, North Dakota and Manitoba.

Additional varieties are now competing for the \$1,000 prize first placed several years ago for an ideal Minnesota apple. It must be "as hardy and prolific as the Duchess"; it must "equally excel in size, quality and appearance"; and it must "keep as well as the Malinda." More than thirty varieties have already undergone the test of the market.

But such tests must be continued, and the various state experimental stations, for a series of years before any approximate judgment can be made as to the triumph of any one variety.

Fine specimens of the variety apple remind the older horticulturists that this choice fruit, now grown and admired the world over, was first grown at Lake Minnetonka, a few miles from Minneapolis, by Peter M. Gideon, forty years ago.

DONE BY SUMMER

The New Capitol Will Be Finished Before Next Session.
Cass Gilbert, architect of the new state capitol, declared at a meeting of the commission yesterday that the building would be completed by the middle of next summer. The interior stone work and finishing are rapidly approaching completion, and tiles and plumbing are being put in. A number of bids on furniture were opened yesterday. Three firms bid on the entire job, the Wallagheer Manufacturing company of Milwaukee presenting a bid of \$97,610. Herter Bros. of New York bid \$117,900 and the E. D. Wadleton company of New York \$150,210. A number of bids were presented on standard furniture and special furniture, and the Wallagheer Manufacturing company was lowest on both schedules, bidding \$40,700 and \$37,943.

Interested in the Effort to Get Lower Rates for Illinois Coal.

MORE COUNTRY ELEVATORS

Growth in Number Shown by Grain Inspection Department.

The natural growth of the country elevator business is shown by the annual report of Henry Feig, country elevator inspector of the state grain inspection department. The number shown was 1,581, compared with 1,549 last year. Houses are established at 781 stations, an increase of sixty-two since the last year. This is the first ever made by the department:

Of these elevators 338 are independent, 80 being co-operative. Twenty-seven line firms run 15 or more houses; 23 run from 10 to 15; 20 run from 4 to 8 houses, and 54 have from 2 to 4 houses each.

One recommendation by the inspector is for a scale inspector, the license fees to be increased to cover the additional expense and to make the department self-sustaining, as the receipts were \$1,593 and the disbursements \$1,507 last year.

It is recommended also that the giving of "slips" for grain be made criminal, or the use of any except the receipt provided by law. The use of slips has given rise to much litigation.
