

NONPARTIZAN IN
BROADER SENSE
CONDUCT OF COMMERCE AND
LABOR DEPARTMENT.

Secretary Cortelyou Issues His First
Report—Describes the Character of
the Work to Be Done and the Lim-
its That Are Placed Upon the Dif-
ferent Bureaus.

Washington, Dec. 10.—Secretary
Cortelyou, in the first report of the
department of commerce and labor,
says:

"The department deals with the
great concerns of commercial and in-
dustrial life. To be of service to
these interests it must have the
heartiest co-operation and support.
It must be nonpartizan in the high-
est and broadest sense. It must re-
cognize no distinction, as between large
and small interests, as between the
arrogant or powerful and the humblest
citizen. If it attempts to occupy a
field that properly belongs to private
endeavor it will inevitably fail to
realize the high hopes of its prede-
cessors. It must adhere rigidly to
the lines marked out since the
foundation of the government for fed-
eral agencies in executing the will of
the people. If these general prin-
ciples are made effective, if conserva-
tism and impartiality, coupled with
ever-increasing efficiency, mark its
administration, I cannot but believe
that this new department will be-
come a mighty influence for good in
our commercial and industrial af-
fairs."

Reliable Statistics.

The department aims to furnish the
business world with more com-
plete and more reliable statis-
tical reports upon the various sub-
jects of commercial and industrial in-
terest. Special efforts are being made
to extend its facilities for supplying
foreign trade information, and more
active assistance will be required from
the consular service, Mr. Cortelyou
says.

It is proposed to establish an office
for the collection and distribution of
foreign-tariff information.

Statements of facts and statistics
issued by this department will be non-
partisan, not only in the usual polit-
ical sense of the word, but in the
broader sense of freedom from the
bias of preconceived theories or of
predilections toward or against in-
dividuals, associations or organiza-
tions.

By various publications the depart-
ment presents to the public daily,
monthly and annual statements of the
commerce of the United States and
of foreign countries, bringing to the
attention of those interested oppor-
tunities for trade extension in the
various quarters of the world.

The organization of the bureau of
manufactures has been necessarily
expedited in the absence of adequate
appropriations.

It is the duty of the bureau of cor-
porations to gather information on the
subject of interstate and foreign com-
merce, to investigate the organization,
conduct and management of cor-
porations and joint-stock companies en-
gaged in interstate and foreign com-
merce, to report the results of such
investigations to the president
through the secretary of commerce,
and to compile and publish use-
ful information concerning cor-
porations engaged in interstate and for-
eign commerce, including insurance
companies.

The creation of the bureau was
viewed by some with alarm, or at
least with suspicion. It was feared
that the powers granted might be
hastily or invidiously used to the in-
jury of legitimate enterprise. No such
purpose actuated the framers of the
law; no such purpose will control its
administration.

Labor and Capital.

The department is empowered to ac-
quire and diffuse among the people of
the United States useful information
on subjects connected with labor, in
the most general and comprehensive
sense of the word, especially regard-
ing its relation to capital. It cannot
interfere on behalf of either employer
or employee in any dispute between
them. Its authority warrants the
department in publishing any in-
formation drawn from conditions
in the or in other countries
which will be helpful in bringing
about fuller knowledge and better un-
derstanding.

Immigration.

Immigration is one of the depart-
ment's most important administrative
problems.

The report of the commissioner gen-
eral regarding the fraudulent use of
naturalization papers demands serious
attention. The extent to which such
frauds are successfully practiced in
order to evade the immigration laws
shows clearly the need of legislation to
safeguard more thoroughly the method
of obtaining citizenship and to prevent
the fraudulent use of certificates of
naturalization.

CRIMINALS IN CHICAGO

SAID TO CONTROL POLICE, POLI-
TICIANS, MAGISTRATES AND
ENTIRE SITUATION.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—More than 1,000
cases are awaiting trial in the crim-
inal court, and the result is that
State's Attorney Densen, driven to his
wit's end to reduce the docket, has
demanded that the grand jury be
waiting trials and thus give him and
his assistants free rein to keep up
with the work ordinarily required of
them and cope with the increased lab-
or imposed upon the office monthly
by grand juries.

There are more than 600 persons
in the court jail, half of them await-
ing trial. Assistant State's Attorney
Barney says that in the last six years
of the Cook county grand jury had
passed on more than 4,000 cases a
year, returning about 3,000 indict-
ments annually. Many cases now
pending have been called at each of
three terms of court and must be
disposed of at once.

A mass meeting of Hyde Park citi-
zens was held last night to start a
movement to demand more police pro-
tection for the district. The speakers
declared that there is an alliance be-
tween police officials and powerful
politicians which protects criminals
and prevents their apprehension.

In spite of the graft investigation
which has exposed official corruption
in the police department, the authori-
ties have been called at each of three
terms of court and must be disposed
of at once.

The arrest of the car barn murderers
seemed to have been a signal for
obtaining citizenship and to prevent
the fraudulent use of certificates of
naturalization.

The police department seems for the
most part to be stupefied and no
account of shaking up success to
arouse it. Inspector Schuetler, prob-
ably the most efficient man on the
force, has been made assistant chief,
but until the department is completely
cleaned out the appointment cannot
do much good. It simply removes an
efficient executive man to an office
job where he plays second fiddle.

Chief O'Neil and Mayor Harrison
blame the newspapers for the sudden
increase in crime, saying that the
publicity given to the careers of the
car barn murderers incited other men
to follow in their footsteps, but this
is regarded as a specious defense.

They also denounce justices and
judges for light sentences at this time.
There is some truth in this, for a
large proportion of suspicious char-
acters who are arrested are dis-
charged without fine for violation of
the law against carrying revolvers.

PREDICTS RATE WAR

Prominent Operating Official Says It
Is Sure to Come.

New York, Dec. 10.—One of the
most prominent operating officials in
the United States, who has served his
years also in the traffic department,
says: "I don't like to think of it,
but am as certain as I am of to-mor-
row's sun that we have not seen the
last big rate war west of the Mis-
sissippi. There is going to be war on
the first crop failure if it doesn't come
before that time.

"Just at present Missouri Pacific
and Frisco are shaping for a scrap.
Rock Island went to Mr. Gould and
said: 'We want a right of way over
your new line to the gulf, with the
right to do local business. If we don't
get it we shall build.'

"Mr. Gould told them after a while
to go ahead and build. And they are
doing it to-day. There are going to
be two lines down the west shore of
the Mississippi 300 miles long and
nowhere more than two miles apart.
That is, unless somebody comes to
their senses. I don't know the pros
and cons, but it's an easy guess that
somebody is wrong. The sooner they
find out who it is the sooner I shall
sleep at night, for I, too, have inter-
ests in the Missouri Pacific country
and in Frisco.

"Of course, Great Western is raising
a row. It would be funny if there
were no little lapses like this into the
old state of affairs. Mr. Stickney is
an altruist. He saw that there was
a big margin of profit in business from
Omaha to Minneapolis over his nice
new line at the old rates, and he de-
termined to give a slice of it to the
shippers. It is the brand of altru-
ism that begins at home. It doesn't
touch his next door neighbors, the
railroads, at all. That's the rub. How-
ever, they may fix it up. It alone
will not disorganize the universe any-
way.

"It is going to break out in the far

north next. That is more or less hear-
say on my part, but it's a guess from
the headquarters unless my informant
failed to tell the truth. Then we shall
have it top, middle and bottom. Look
out for it."
