NATIONAL GUARD TOGS

Just Like the Regular Army Rig Except the Cape.

Material changes in the uniforms worn by the state militia are recommended in a report to be made by the committee appointed by the officers of the national guard to decide on uniforms. With some differences in detail, the regular army uniform will be recommended. The insignia, instead of the regular army insignia, will be worn on the coat collar, and overcoats instead of capes will be used by the officers. The lining of the infantry officers' capes will be white instead of the regular army light blue.

CITY NEWS.

EXTEND TIME FOR BURYING WIRES

COUNCIL MAY GIVE TELEPHONE COMPANIES A YEAR GRACE.

Committee Will Recommend that They Be Allowed Until Jan. 1, 1905, to Complete the Work—Lively Scrap Between the Companies and the House Movers.

An extension of the provisions of the present underground wires ordinance for a year is recommended by the council committee on underground wires, and a report to that effect will be submitted to the council this evening. The time of the committee this morning was taken up largely by representatives of companies which do business with the city in the laying of the new ordinance which has been under discussion for several months does not suit the companies. It establishes the limit as far out as Franklin avenue and Tenth avenue and on the north to Lyndale, Hawthorn and Third avenues N., with a strip including the companies' main and Second street as far as Plymouth avenue, Twentieth and Plymouth avenues N., as far as Girard avenue, Hennepin, Nicollet, First, Third, Fourth and fifth streets and are included in the first street are also included in the conduit district.

The Twin City Telephone company was willing to accept the ordinance with minor changes, but the Minneapolis General Electric company and the Northwestern Telephone company objected strenuously and it was decided to make no changes in the ordinance, however, but to extend the time for burying the wires from Jan. 1, 1904, to Jan. 1, 1905.

After the meeting there was a lively debate between the number of housemovers and the representatives of the electric companies over cutting wires, to admit the moving of houses. F. W. Pratt declared that the companies had no monopoly on the air and that the electric companies had no legal right to make a charge for cutting and replacing wires in order to admit the passage of a house.

General Superintendent J. W. Christie of the Northwestern Telephone company reminded Mr. Pratt that there was such authority.

"But it won't do it," retorted Mr. Christie.

"Well, you ought to know," replied Mr. Pratt. "You beat us once in this council, but you don't want to forget that there is another coming."

A number of citizens, City Attorney Healy and some aldermen urged the companies and Mr. Pratt to get together on some compromise, but Mr. Pratt refused to budge. He has a house standing on Mount Curve avenue which is blocked by wires. It has been there two weeks, and will probably remain for years unless Mr. Pratt gets his message to the owner of the house pays the telephone company's price.

The whole fight will be fought over against Superintendent Alderman F. M. Powers introduces his ordinance requiring that electric wires be taken down for the benefit of housemoving on twenty-four hours' notice.

POOR PLACE FOR SLEEP

LUNATIC TRIES TO GO TO BED IN MAYOR HAYNES' OFFICE IN CITY HALL.

Another lunatic, whose chief occupation seems to be to bother Mayor Haynes, was taken into custody by Chief Conroy this morning.

The man hung around the mayor's reception room for nearly two hours, and when Chief Conroy asked him what he wanted, he said he was just waiting to go to bed, as the judge of the supreme court had told him he could live in the mayor's offices for four years.

The judge arrested him without a warrant, he said, and sentenced him to four years in the penitentiary without a trial. Later the judge relented and sentenced him to the same length of time.

While he was waiting in Chief Conroy's outer office, he made up his mind to leave and told the other persons that if the chief wanted to talk with him he would be at the governor's office in St. Paul. He left the room and officers are now looking for him.

COACH YOST THINKS MINNESOTA MAN THE BEST QUARTERBACK IN THE COUNTRY.

Minnesota figures in two All-American football elevens selected so far. Coach Yost of Michigan picks Harris for the All-American quarter, and Schacht for the second team tackle. Heston and Maddock of Michigan are placed on the All-American first teams. In regard to Harris, Yost says:

"Harris, the Minnesota quarterback, is very fast and accurate. He is a wonder in the back field catching punts and tackling, and is also good in running back punts. Heston, whom I pick for a half, weighs 180, and can run over the hundred in 10 1/2. He is wonderfully strong and a good dodger. Maddock is an all-round athlete. He throws the hammer 145 feet. He weighs 194, is very fast and splendid in both offense and defense. My choice for an All-American would be:
