DON'T KNOW WHETHER TO EXHIBIT AT ST. LOUIS OR NOT.

One Party Says It Won't Pay as Tariffs Are Prohibitive. The Other Says Norway's Dignity as a Sovereign Nation Is at Stake—Little Time Is Left.

Norway is getting a little shaky again on the proposition to exhibit at the world's fair. After the new ministry had withdrawn the proposition of the former ministry to appropriate 100,000 kroner for a Norwegian exhibit, it is supposed that the matter was ended. The ministry has taken it up again, however, and after more or less consideration has virtually referred the whole question without recommendation to the storting.

Sentiment is divided in Norway. Many of the papers, possibly the majority, oppose a Norwegian exhibit, urging that the time is too short to accomplish anything creditable and that there is nothing to gain by exhibiting for an account of the high tariff Norway will not be able to export much to the United States. The reasons given are not at all convincing. The opponents have several reasons why Norway should make a suitable display at the biggest world's fair ever arranged. URGED TO REVOLT

The Russian Revolutionists Are Active in Finland.

Russian revolutionists are said to be working persistently to spread the gospel of revolt in Finland. Individual outbreaks are increasing in number as an aggravating addition to General Bobrikoff's tyrannous censorship of libraries and papers and his expulsion of private citizens. The sum of Russian outrages in Finland places a heavy strain on the naturally loyal and peace-loving Finns. It is expected that hundreds and possibly thousands will finally yield to the proselytizing campaign of Russian revolutionary emissaries. Recently Captain G. Fraser was expelled from Finland with the privilege of living in Russia proper. He immediately moved to St. Petersburg, thinking this would remove all shadow of suspicion from him. One night about a week ago he was roused by gendarmes, ordered to dress, handcuffed, gagged and led away in a military office where he was chained with political exiles bound for Siberia. Finland is a highly respectable Finn of irreproachable character.

WILL CHEAT NEPTUNE

Captain Doenig's Life Saving Globe Is a Success.

Another successful trial of the Doenig life-saving globe was made near the Skaw on the dangerous North Jutland coast during a storm last Friday. After a trial had been made with a ballast buoy, the inventor, Captain Doenig, with four other persons, entered a buoy which was launched from the cruiser Helmsdal. It successfully cleared the rocks and shoals and drifted safely ashore. The invention of Captain Doenig was given successful trial in the English channel between Dover and South Foreland in November, 1902. In the heavy sea the globe rode over the waves like a cork and was remarkably steady. After tossing the globe, the inventor, Captain Doenig, and one of the sailors who was with him in the globe, emerged from the manhole and lashing themselves to the outside of it, set a small sail and steered in a fairly direct course for several miles and into Dover harbor. The apparatus is made of light steel plates and is surrounded by a cork jacket. It has a flat double bottom containing tanks which can be filled with fresh water and used as ballast. There are also compartments for stowage of provisions, comfortably hold sixteen persons.

A LITTLE CHILD DID IT

Captured the Swedish Flag at the World's Fair Grounds.

One of the most interesting features of the dedication of the site for the Swedish pavilion at the world's fair was the capture of the Swedish flag by little Charlotte d'Ally, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. d'Ally, 3442 Lawton avenue, Mr. d'Ally, who was born in Stockholm, Sweden, and for years been employed as a civil engineer by the Mississippi river commission, and Mrs. d'Ally is a native of Louisiana. Little Charlotte, who is but 8 years old, had been especially dressed for the occasion in a costume of red, white and blue with a sash of the Swedish colors, blue and yellow. The costume, as a whole, was most becoming, and the pretty little girl was the recipient of many congratulations for the graceful manner in which she performed her part.

Emerges from Ice Prison.

Dr. Otto Nordenkjöld, whose safe arrival at Buenos Aires from a perilous cruise in Antarctic waters, has brought joy to many a home in Sweden. Dr. Nordenkjöld is a member of the famous Arctic explorer, Baron Nordenkjöld, and one of the most intrepid of the venturesome men who have risked their lives to obtain knowledge of the frozen districts that surround the earth's poles. Before his present experience he achieved fame as a traveler in Alaska. On Jan. 15, 1892, Dr. Nordenkjöld went ashore on Pauls Island, where subsequently he was compelled to take his camp while waiting the coming of the rescuing expedition.

A Doughty Norseman.

Jens J. Andersen, an official in the British East African company's service, recently visited his old home in Norway, bringing a fine collection of African relics for the ethnographical museum in Christiania. Since 1885 he has been the district officer of the Inna river district, which would make a whole country in Europe, and has been remarkably efficient. Andersen has been superintendent of an industrial school on Madagascar, a business man in India, an electrician and commercial representative at Zanzibar.

Fishing Was Fine. Very satisfactory returns are made of the herring fisheries in Norway, for the past season. The total haul was 375,000

barrels, nearly all of which of most excellent quality. Last year the catch was only half as large, and of inferior quality. The figures for the season are considerably greater than the average for the past ten years and the conditions along the coast much improved, particularly as the cod have also been more numerous.

Swedes in Kansas City.
 Although the First Swedish Lutheran church in Kansas City is fifteen years old, it was not dedicated until last week, for there is an unwritten law in the Augustana synod that its churches shall not be formally dedicated until they are free from debt. A mortgage of \$11,000 has been paid off in four years, largely thru the efforts of Rev. A. W. Lindquist, the pastor. Among the sponsors at the exercises were Dr. G. A. Swenson of Lindesberg, Dr. G. A. Brandelle and Rev. S. P. A. Lindahl of Rock Island.

Venerable Lawmaker.
 Dr. Geert Winther, one of the few surviving members of the riksdag, which, together with King Fredrik VII., gave Denmark the constitution of 1849, celebrated his ninetieth birthday Nov. 20. The venerable politician was honored in several ways by his friends. A deputation from Odsher, who formerly represented in the riksdag, presented an address of congratulation.

Revolution in Papermaking.
 President Garrett Schenck of the Great Northern Paper company, the largest manufacturer of paper in the country, is so impressed with Dr. Vikko Drewe's discovery for producing paper from corn that he is organizing a stock company to make corn paper on an extensive scale.

Military Severity.
 The Swedish press is taking up the cause of the Swedish soldiers who are ill treated by the officers. Almost countless instances of brutality and undue severity are mentioned in a strong sentiment for reform is growing. It is no wonder that the young men avoid military service and even flee from the country to escape it.

How Many Danes?
 The first report of the Danish census of 1901 which has just been published, shows that Denmark had a population of 2,449,540 on Feb. 1, 1901. This is an increase in eleven years of 277,190. As in other countries the cities, particularly the larger ones, show much growth while the smaller towns and country stand still or go backward.

Another Merger.
 An arrangement has been made by the storting for the Swedish and Norwegian to maintain a joint office and a consulate in Gothenburg, which will be opened early next year. The interested concerns have an annual production valued at \$5,000,000 kroner.

Swedish Abyssinian.
 Marcus Germy, a native Abyssinian, who is regarded among his countrymen as a Christian, has been frequently invited to preach in the churches. Naturally he attracts great attention. In 1887 Germy was a waiter in a restaurant in Gothenburg. His innate talent attracted such attention that he was sent to school and prepared for the ministry.

Prize for Peace-Maker.
 William G. Cramer, M.P., publisher of "The Arbitrator," London, has been awarded the Nobel prize for his work in the storting for his work in the promotion of international arbitration. The Nobel prizes this year will yield the fortunate winners \$25,000.

Women Can't Vote.
 By a unanimous vote the Norwegian storting rejected Wednesday the proposition to extend universal suffrage to women. The vote was taken immediately after the reading of an appeal from the Women's Suffrage association. Women have had for some time a vote in communal affairs, but in no other way.

Denmark Delivers Benefit.
 The Danish DeLovs association, which has been discussing the growth of emigration to America, has decided by a considerable majority that the benefits to Denmark therefrom far outweigh the drawbacks. The speakers who brought up the subject contended that some action was necessary to prevent the country from being denuded of its best workers, but the majority support the view that the Danes were to be congratulated on the fact that the doors of such a progressive and prosperous country as the United States were open to them, and that Denmark had much benefited by the considerable sums of money which yearly were sent back by her former subjects.

Kind to Each Other.
 The Danish Folkething has increased the per diem of its members from 6 kroner to 10 kroner together with mileage to and from the capital. The increased per diem is to continue only six months, however, after which it will fall again to the old rate.
