QUIST WILL APPEAL
 If Successful, Slander Suit Will Be a Campaign Feature.

James Peterson, one of the attorneys for Charles A. Quist in his action for slander against Joseph Kilchli, stated today that an appeal would be taken from Judge Harrison's decision granting the defendant's demurrer to the complaint. The plaintiff contends that the court erred in holding that the statement alleged to have been made by Kilchli to Mike Breslau was not a cause of action per se and he wants a supreme court ruling thereon before he takes his case to a jury. The other faults in the complaint can be remedied by amendment.

This demurrer and the appeal therefrom will necessitate the continuance of the case until the April term of court. This will bring the trial in the heat of the next campaign.

OLD BREWERY GOING
 Brewing Company Sells It and It Is Being "Wrecked."

The Minneapolis Brewing company has sold the material in the old Miller & Heinrich brewery at Fourth street and the river, and the building is being torn down. The original frame part of the brewery was built in 1866 by John G. Kraentzel and John B. Miller. In 1874 John Heinrich and Mr. Miller bought the brewery and built the first addition. The old part was torn down in 1885 and a new addition built. When the breweries were consolidated in 1894 this brewery was put in at a valuation of \$225,000. For about ten years the brewery has been vacant.

When the establishment was built an extensive cooling system of pipes was excavated on the west side of the river twenty-two feet wide and extending back 400 feet. Several arms branch from the main subway making a total length of about half a mile. Before this plan was adopted the brewing company dug the famous East Side cave.

The steamer Minneapolis once made a trip to the river wharf built near the brewery and was photographed at the time. The warehouse was later torn down, as it was found to be unsafe.

Mr. Kraentzel is now retired and traveling in Europe. He went to Milwaukee in 1871 and later built a brewery at Faribault. Mr. Miller died several years ago.

PREXY WON'T SPEAK SO OFTEN
 President Northrop Says It Takes Too Much Time.

PACKAGES HELD FOR POSTAGE
 Christmas Presents That Won't Reach Places Intended.

Despite the notice recently published that packages of merchandise mailed to foreign countries must bear much more than domestic postage, nearly half a thousand such packages are held at the post-office as "not fully prepaid." They will be held thirty days and then sent to the dead-letter office at Washington.

Persons mailing Christmas presents to Europe are requested to inquire the exact rate of postage and to make sure that the packages are weighed correctly.
