It is particularly in the field of industrial training that the attention of educators should be directed...

The true bill was a scathing arraignment of the character and professions of the defendant, set forth by Judge J. Debrails from the records of the occult academy of occult sciences, rooms 521, 522, 523 Bank of Minneapolis building, upon the representations of the defendant that the academy had 112 pupils; that the academy amounted to between \$50 and \$100 per day; that it was equipped with "adept faculty of orientals from Bonares, India, and clairvoyants and teachers," and that the furniture of the academy, valued at \$270, was all paid for except \$25.
