WON'T PART THE BONDS

COURT DECIDES NOT TO GRANT DIVORCE IN THE CASE OF MYRTLE VS. LEO LONGNECKER.

In case of doubt deny the divorce, is the substance of a ruling made by Judge Elliott in the divorce case of Myrtle Longnecker against Leo M. Longnecker. The judge, unable to decide which of two stories told by Mrs. Longnecker is true, has decided to leave undisturbed the matrimonial bonds which bind the couple. Several days ago a hearing was had in the case and it then appeared that the plaintiff had been deserted and greatly abused and was entitled to the separation she asked. The woman was under the impression that the court would grant her the desired divorce, and so purchased a ticket for an Iowa point and waited the filing of the decree.

Then came a notary public with a document, signed by Mr. and Mrs. Longnecker, in which the latter agreed to bring the action for a divorce upon the payment of \$200 and other considerations. This new evidence caused Judge Elliott to give another hearing in the case and Mr. Longnecker yesterday explained on the stand that she had been forced by divers circumstances to make the affidavit presented in evidence altho it was not just according to the facts. As much as she had sworn to one thing on the stand and another thing in the affidavit and had been married, divorced and remarried all during the course of a year Judge Elliott decided that he would leave the couple wed.

CITY NEWS.

THE GRAND JURY SEEMS LONESOME

MEETS WITH NO COHEN CASE TO CONSIDER.

Members of That Body Have About Decided that Nothing More Can Be Done to Bring Ames' Aide to Book.

As a subject for investigation Joseph Cohen, some time lieutenant to Mayor Ames, has been finally dismissed by the grand jury and county attorney's office of Hennepin county. The man who, against a mass of circumstances, once pleaded guilty of the charge of bribery, subsequently withdrew the charge and was thereafter indicted fourteen times, tried twice and then given freedom from prosecution by the rulings of Judge Simpson, will never be tried again, in all probability. Inasmuch as all the cases against him must be nolleed on the ground that he was relieved from prosecution because of his testimony before the grand jury, the Hennepin county officials are decided that further attempts at prosecution would be futile. The present grand jury is therefore, to-day, devoting its attention almost entirely to the cases which these and some recommendations for a new floor to the county jail and some possible attention to former Captain Charles R. Hill will have nothing to do at this session.

GUESSED THE TEMPERATURE

Director Outram Named Morning's Coldest Point in Advance.

The local prediction of Section Director T. S. Outram of the weather bureau that the cold wave last night would bring a minimum temperature near zero this morning was exactly verified. This minimum was touched at 7 a. m. In St. Paul at the same hour the weather was 2 degrees colder. The mercury has been rising gradually since morning and will continue to aspire. To-morrow morning the record will be somewhere near 15 degrees above zero, and to-morrow afternoon the wind will be tempered to the matinee girl. Even Medicine Hat, in far away Assiniboia, was warmer than Minneapolis this morning, so tropical has become the usual source of the Manitoba wave. At the Hat the mercury indicated 28 degrees above, in Edmonton, in Alberta, 24 above, and at Calgary Alberta, 22 above. Duluth, 4 below, was the coldest station in the United States or Canada.

POLICE CRITICIZED

Judge Holt Cannot Uphold Their Method of Catching Women.

"I do not approve of the methods of the police officers in clearing the streets of objectionable women," said Judge Holt in police court this morning. "Altho this woman is undoubtedly guilty of the charge I can not find in her statements, when the officers made the first advance." This decision was rendered in the case of Annie Peterson, who was arrested last Friday night. The woman admitted that she did not have a good name, but said the officers accosted her on the street. The officers admitted that her statements were true and the case was dismissed. The officers who made the arrest are patrolmen who have been detailed in plain clothes by the order of Chief Conroy.

CAN'T COUNT A DEAD MAN

COURT WON'T RECOGNIZE SUCH A DEFENDANT IN A SUIT.

An Application for a Change of Venue by Three Defendants Is Not Allowed Because One of Them Is Dead—Judge Harrison's Ruling in an Unusual Case.


A dead man may not be counted a defendant in a proceeding at law, is the ruling made by Judge Harrison of the district court in the case of George S. Grimes against Spencer Erickson, S. R. Child, C. L. Kohler, Henry J. Hosmer and Ida Gahl. A petition was presented asking for a change of venue to Kandiyohi county, where it was represented, a majority of the defendants lived, and where, under the statutes, the case should, therefore, properly be tried. It was assumed that the application for change of venue was made by Spencer Erickson, S. R. Child and Henry Hosmer of Kandiyohi county, constituting a majority of the defendants. But an affidavit presented by the two defendants who did not want the case transferred, showed conclusively that Hosmer was dead at the time that the demand for a change of venue was made. This left only two names signed to the application, and the defendants being equally divided to the desired place for the hearing, the case remains in Hennepin county, where it was commenced. In a memorandum attached to the order preventing the change of venue, Judge Harrison says: "I have no idea that a change of venue can be effected so as tooust the court of jurisdiction in the matter by the mere filing of a demand in the name of parties not in existence. "It is undisputed that Henry J. Hosmer, named as one of the defendants, was dead prior to the commencement of the action, so that the demand for a change was only made by the defendants Spencer Erickson and S. R. Child, who were two other defendants who did not join in this demand; therefore, it did not come within the provisions of section 1, chapter 34, of the general laws of the state of Minnesota, for the year 1903, which provides that where, in any cause of action, there are several defendants residing in different counties, the action shall be brought in the county where a majority of said defendants shall unite in such demand. "The majority of the defendants did not unite in the demand, therefore it was void and of no force to effect a change. "The counsel for the defendants appearing considered the demand bearing the name of Henry J. Hosmer and two other defendants, was sufficient upon its face, and, therefore, wouldoust the court of any jurisdiction to pass upon the application and demand. "This, we think, would be a very unreasonable construction of the statute, and we think that no such demand has been made as the law provides shall work a transfer of the case, then it seems to me that it is not to be taken into consideration and see that this cause is not sent from the county where it was properly commenced."

BAD YOUTH SENTENCED
Purse-Snatcher Sent to Reformatory—Elge to Stillwater.
Two erring youths were sent to serve the holidays behind the bars this morning by Judge Simpson of the district court. Joseph LeClaire, a pocketbook snatcher, was sent to the St. Cloud reformatory, this being his first conviction. Peter Elge, convicted of forgery in the second degree, was given two years in Stillwater. Attorney James A. Peterson pleaded for a reformatory sentence, in view of the fact that the companion who had turned state's evidence in the case, had gotten off scot free, and his other companion, Brown, had been given a St. Cloud sentence after pleading guilty. Judge Simpson, however, thought that a young man who had spent the summer entirely with a gang whose members unquestionably would not hesitate at murder to carry out their designs, should be given a state's prison sentence in the interests of equal justice. The sentencing of Elge temporarily disposes of a gang which gave the police a great deal of trouble during the summer.

COUNTY TO HAVE A DAIRY
SHERIFF DREGER GOES OUT TO EDINA TO TAKE OFFICIAL POSSESSION OF A LARGE MILK FACTORY.
Before nightfall it is promised that the county of Hennepin, state of Minnesota, will be in possession of a nice young dairy business, which it may not know what to do with and may have some trouble in getting rid of.
In satisfaction of a claim of \$200, Sheriff J. W. Dreger and Deputy Sheriff John Wall went out to Edina township, beyond Lake Harriet, this afternoon and levied upon the dairy herd owned by Aleck P. Graham. When the officers left the city it was on the program that the herd, in so far as it was necessary to satisfy the claim, should be corralled, a watchman left in charge, and the stock fed and cared for by the county until the claim had either been paid or the stock disposed of.
A watchman, whose business it is to live with the attached stock twenty-four hours a day and see that it is milked, was taken out to Edina to spend the holidays.

REDUCING AUGSBURG'S DEBT
More Than \$20,000 Has Been Raised in Six Months.
Over \$20,000 has been raised by the Norwegian Lutheran Free church since its annual meeting last June for lifting the debt on Augsburg seminary. The money has been obtained largely thru the efforts of Professor Sven Oftedal, who has pledged himself to wipe out the debt before he leaves the institution. His resignation is already in and it will take effect at the end of the present school year.

GEN. BECKER VERY ILL
Well Known Minnesota Citizen Is Down with Pneumonia.
General George I. Becker, a prominent figure in Minnesota history for more than half-century is seriously ill with pneumonia, at his home, 601 Summit avenue, St. Paul. He was alderman and mayor of St. Paul in the early fifties, has served in the state legislature, and was on the railway and warehouse commission for a number of years. In 1859 and 1894 he was the nominee of the democratic party for governor.
Last evening General Becker was to have attended the semi-centennial celebration of Minnesota chapter, No. 1, Royal Arch Masons, which was organized in his office in St. Paul in 1853. General Becker and G. W. Biddle of Sparta, Wis., are the only survivors of the charter members.

A WEALTHY TRAMP
Showed Police \$2,000 When They Showed Him Tramp's Lodging.
Andrew Johnson showed the officers at central police station a roll of bills amounting to nearly \$2,000 last night when he entered the place and they mistook him for a tramp looking for lodging.
The jailor was directing Johnson to the tramping room when the man saw that he was mistaken for an unfortunate. He immediately produced his money, saying he had simply come to the station to place it in safe keeping until morning.
