READY TO MEET MUNROE

JEFFRIES WILL FIGHT BUTTE MINER IF THE LATTER CAN DEFEAT TOM SHARKEY.

Jim Jeffries announced yesterday that he would agree to meet the winner of the bout already arranged between Tom Sharkey and Jack Munroe.

Jack Munroe, the miner pugilist, arrived in Chicago last evening, en route to his home at Butte, Mont.

"I was matched yesterday to fight Tom Sharkey, and I expect the fight to take place in the east. Sharkey will be easy money for me. I'll beat him, and I will get all I possess on the outcome."

After a fast, clean bout at Boston, which went the limit of fifteen rounds, the first ten in which were marked by the aggressive work of his opponent, Jack O'Brien of Philadelphia was given the decision over Jack ("Swifty") Sullivan of Cambridge, before the Criterion Athletic club.

At the ringside O'Brien weighed in at 153 pounds, while Sullivan tipped the scales at 142.

Sullivan was the aggressor from the first round, and O'Brien's fancy leads were blocked and countered prettily.

O'Brien's tactics were almost entirely defensive up to the ninth round, when Sullivan's right eye was closed by a well-directed blow.

After that O'Brien had little difficulty in reaching him. In the thirteenth round, however, O'Brien received a similar injury and the men were again on equal terms.

In the fifteenth round there was a warm mix-up.

FIRST WILL HELD GOOD

NEBRASKA COURT DECLARES THE TESTIMONY OF LAWYER GADSDEN WAS PERJURED.

Special to The Journal. Omaha, Neb., Dec. 23.—Stephen B. Miles of Falls City died several years ago in a hotel in the little town of Rulo. A will was found in his valise when he practically all his property, amounting to about \$3,000,000, to one son, Joseph H. Miles.

The other children, Samuel Miles, a daughter and the children of another daughter, contested this will, presenting a later will alleged to have been drawn in the Southern hotel in St. Louis. This was drawn, it is alleged, by a lawyer of the name of Gadsden.

Judge Thompson yesterday sustained the Rulo will, stating that in his opinion the testimony of Gadsden was untrustworthy. The case will be appealed to the supreme court, this being its third appearance on the docket of that tribunal.

BARRED FROM TRANSVAAL

African Methodist Church Seeks Restoration of Former Privileges.

London, Dec. 23.—"We suddenly find ourselves confronted with a crisis in South Africa, particularly in the Transvaal and Orange River colony," said Bishop Derrick of the African Methodist Episcopal church, who has arrived here from New York, bringing a letter from Francis B. Loomis, assistant secretary of state, to Ambassador Choate.

"As long as those territories were ruled by the Dutch the African Methodist Episcopal church operated with all the freedom accorded to any religious organization whatever. Since the war the British authorities have refused to permit our bishop at Cape Town to enter the Transvaal or the Orange River colony."

Bishop Derrick was received by Ambassador Choate yesterday and preliminary steps were taken to bring the case to the attention of the British colonial office.


