Sheltering Arms Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the board of directors for the Sheltering Arms was held yesterday afternoon in St. Mark's cathedral. The treasurer's report showed that the receipts for the year were \$3,323.27 and expenditures \$3,442.08. As there was a balance left over from last year, the amount on hand is \$472.21. There were forty-six children in the home during the year, and thirty are now being cared for.

The question of building a new home on the 100 acres owned by the society near Minnehaha was discussed. Bishop Edsall deemed it inadvisable to begin building for another year, but expressed the hope that at some time there would be a concentration of Episcopal buildings in the midway district, as Seabury divinity school owns fifty acres in the same locality.
