MINISTER'S SON KILLED

FARGO SQUIERS IS ACCIDENTALLY SHOT AT HAVANA, CUBA, AND DIES WITHIN HALF HOUR.

Havana, Jan. 1.—Fargo Squiers, the eldest son of United States Minister Squiers, was accidentally shot and mortally wounded yesterday by Gaston Michaud, a chauffeur employed by his father.

Young Squiers and several servants were shooting at a target in the coach-house of the minister's residence, in the suburb of Marianao. They were using 22-caliber rifles, and one of them got out of order.

Michaud after examining the weapon reloading it, when suddenly it was discharged in the direction of Squiers, who was standing between Michaud and the target.

The ball penetrated the young man's

left lung. A hemorrhage ensued and within half an hour Squiers died.

No other member of the Squiers family is in Cuba at the present time. Secretary Sleeper, in charge of the legation, sent cablegrams to Minister Squiers at Washington and to Mrs. Squiers at Katonah, N. Y. The body will be forwarded to New York.

THIS WOULD HELP SOME

NEW INVENTION FOR THE AUTOMATIC RECEIPT OF TELEGRAMS IS TESTED AT MILWAUKEE.

Special to The Journal. Milwaukee, Jan. 1.—A test is being made at the office in this city of the Chicago and Milwaukee Telegraph company of a new invention for the automatic receipt of telegrams. It consists of an electrically operated machine which will receive messages from the telegraph relay instrument and change the Morse characters into typewritten words while the message is coming in. This machine is the invention of a Chicago operator, C. E. Gilmore, and is intended for taking and typewriting long messages.

At the Milwaukee office it was stated that the new machine worked without a hitch, taking the longest messages as they were sent from Chicago and instantly printing them in typewritten copy.

A CLEVER SWINDLE

Bogus "British Vice Consul" Makes a Good Haul.

New York, Jan. 1.—By means of a clever and carefully prearranged scheme a man, calling himself S. W. Spencer, representing himself to be the British vice consul at Washington, an office that does not exist, is declared by a banking and exporting-house to have been traveling through Europe since last October defrauding banking-houses with spurious drafts and forged checks drawn on prominent bankers and business men in New York.

The scheme he is alleged to have operated involved his presence here a few months ago. He is said to have visited exporting houses and, representing himself as British vice consul at Washington, secured drafts for large sums on foreign correspondents for shipments of watches for New Jersey makers for whom he pretended to hold power of attorney. The shipments never reached Europe, but Spencer did, and he took along the drafts. He is now supposed to be in Egypt.

BANK CASHIER A SUICIDE

WOOD WAS YOUNG AND WEALTHY AND HAPPY IN HIS HOME AFFAIRS—SENSATION AT ST. CHARLES, IOWA.

Special to The Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, Jan. 1.—Charles F. Wood, cashier of the Citizens' bank at St. Charles, Warren county, was found in his office with a bullet in his brain.

He was 35, worth \$100,000, which he made in a remarkably successful business career, and was supposed to be entirely happy in his domestic relations. He speculated on the Chicago board, but examination indicates no irregularities in his affairs.
