Havana, Jan. 1.-Fargo Squiers, the eldest son of United States Minister Squiers, was accidentally shot and mortally wounded yesterday by Gaston Michaud, a chauffeur employed by his father. Young Squiers and several servants were shooting at a target in the coach-

house of the minister's residence, in the suburb of Marianao. They were using 22-caliber rifles, and one of them got out of order. Michaud after examining the weapon reloaded it, when suddenly it was discharged in the direction of Squiers, who was standing between Michaud and the target.

Bogus "British Vice Consul" Makes a Good Haul.
