

LAI D A TRAP FOR HIM

WALLA WALLA, WASH., DESPERADO ARRESTED BY MONTANA OFFICERS AT THE POINT OF REVOLVERS.

Billings, Mont., Jan. 4.—Sheriff Hubbard and Stock Inspector Webb yesterday afternoon placed "Briek" Johnson, an alleged Walla Walla desperado, Washington, desperado, under arrest at the point of their revolvers. In circulars sent out by the Washington authorities, all officers were

warned against taking any chances in arresting Johnson as he was always armed and would fight. He has been staying at the ranch of a relative near this city for several weeks during which time he has been under the surveillance of the officers. Hubbard and Webb decided not to arrest Johnson at the ranch for fear of a fight and laid a trap for him in town. He has been fully identified as the Walla Walla fugitive by five bullet scars on different parts of his body. Johnson made no attempt at resistance and quietly permitted himself to be placed in the county jail. It is not known here what charge the Washington officers place against Johnson. MARYLAND RAILROAD WRECK

Two Killed and Many Injured—Rail Was Broken. Hagerstown, Md., Jan. 4.—Two persons were killed and a number injured by the derailment of three passenger cars of an east-bound passenger train on the Western Maryland railroad yesterday, near Blue Mountain House station, fifteen miles from here. Katherine Sener, 8 years old, daughter of a Baltimore newspaper man, died in the arms of the conductor, after being taken from the wrecked car. An unknown woman was so wedged in the wreckage that her dead body is unrecognizable. It is thought that she was Mrs. E. E. Roy, or Foy, of Philadelphia. She was about 35. Mrs. Sener, mother of the dead child,

is probably fatally injured. Her son, 6 years old, was seriously injured. The train, consisting of five cars and engine, was bowling along up the steep grade at about fifteen miles an hour, when the accident occurred. All except the ladies' car passed safely over the broken rail which caused the accident. The ladies' coach, which was the last, rolled over and over down the mountain side, a distance of eighty feet, and landed bottom upwards. The baggage car and smoker were pulled from the track, but did not go over the bank. STEEL TRUST MAY EXPAND. Austin, Texas, Jan. 4.—The United States Steel trust, alarmed over the prospects of the Mexican government placing a prohibitive duty on steel rails and on other steel products, has made an effort for the purchase of the plant of the Monterey Iron and Steel company at Monterey, which cost \$10,000,000.

Will Pass the Remainder of His Days in Soldiers' Home. New York, Jan. 4.—John S. Downing, who was sentenced to life imprisonment on Jan. 13, 1879, and who has spent the intervening time in Sing Sing prison for the murder of his wife, has been released. Detroit, Mich.—Lawrence Depey, brother of United States Senator Chauncey M. Depey, of New York, and one of the most prominent citizens of Detroit, fell dead. Chicago—John W. Strong, for several years commercial editor of the Chicago Tribune, died yesterday morning in his bath on board of the Monoc train, a short time before the latter reached Indianapolis.
