"GROVER CLEVELAND THE MAN OF ALL MEN."

Demonstration at McClellan Banquet in New York—Richard Olney of Massachusetts Names the Man and David B. Hill of New York Outlines the Platform with Which the Democrats Hope to Succeed in the Presidential Election.

New York, Jan. 5.—"Mr. Chairman, the man of all men most thoroly representative of the national policy I have indicated; the most capable and sure of making things effective—the opportunity being given—the man of the proven courage in his convictions, who never yet turned his back upon the approach of public duty, and is too old to learn how; that man unfortunately absent at this time, but a New Yorker by adoption, if not by birth, and one whom New York has always delighted to honor—that man is Grover Cleveland, whose record in the past is an all-sufficient guarantee of his action in the future."

These were the opening words of Richard Olney, who was one of the principal speakers at the democratic banquet at Sherry's last night. The occasion was nominally a celebration of the commencement of the administration of George B. McClellan as mayor of New York, but in reality a demonstration for democratic principles and harmony in preparation for the coming presidential campaign.

Former President Cleveland was announced as one of the speakers, but a letter requesting him to attend at the last moment. Judge Alton B. Parker, Senator Arthur P. Gorman and Senator John F. Morgan of Alabama were also expected but sent letters instead. Mr. Cleveland wrote as follows:

Cleveland's Letter. While the assumption of the duty involved in the government of the greatest city of our country carries grave responsibilities, the impression that cannot be evaded that the manner in which the democracy of the city shall meet its municipal responsibilities will, in a large degree, determine the extent to which the fellow countrymen of every part of the land will be willing to trust the democracy of the nation in broader fields of governmental rule.

Those far beyond the limit of New York who love the democratic party confidently expect that the methods of the new municipal administration will be so clear, efficient and its high purposes so manifest in all things as to impress the entire country with the security and peace promised by the national supremacy of a safe and conservative democracy.

The speakers included Mayor McClellan, Richard Olney, David B. Hill, Charles A. Towne and Congressman De Armond. Ex-congressman W. Bourke Cochran, acted as toastmaster. David Hill's Program.

Former Governor David B. Hill devoted the greater portion of his speech to a denunciation of President Roosevelt. In suggesting a platform for the democratic party Mr. Hill urged planks for "tariff revision which shall secure equal privileges to all, revenues limited to the national treasury, and an equitable adjustment of exorbitant duties, and adequate laws for the regulation and control of combinations of capital."

There ought not to be any difficulty at this time in framing a financial plank acceptable to every intelligent and reasonable democrat. The logic of events has cleared the situation. It is not believed that any further monetary legislation is now desirable. If a specific plan on this subject is needed, then a simple declaration in favor of international bimetalism to be secured by an agreement between the leading nations of the world, in the event that further coinage legislation becomes necessary, would be most desirable.

Planks for the election of United States senators by direct vote; rigid adherence to the Monroe doctrine and the avoidance of an eastern policy preventing its consistent enforcement; the admission to statehood of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona; and opposition to the "maintenance of American possessions of colonial systems of government antagonistic to the British colonial system" were urged.

Among others present were Congressman David De Armond of Missouri, ex-Governor James H. Campbell of Pennsylvania, William A. Gaston of Boston and Charles F. Murphy, now leader of Tammany Hall.

FOR ROOSEVELT Mass Meeting at Lincoln Declares for the President.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 5.—At a largely attended mass meeting last night, presided over by Governor Mickey, resolutions were adopted commending the administration of President Roosevelt and declaring it to be the sense of the meeting that the republican state convention instruct the delegation to the national convention at Chicago "to work and vote for his nomination first, last and all the time."

OPPOSITION IS FOILED PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S PANAMA MESSAGE LEAVES NO ROOM FOR CRITICISM OF TREATY.

Washington, Jan. 5.—President Roosevelt's presentation of the course of events connected with the Panama canal and the recognition of the isthmian republic has taken all the wind out of the sails of the opposition. The administration has presented a clean record, and congress has been placed in possession of all the diplomatic correspondence on the subject and all the instructions given to the American naval commanders who were present when the revolution took place.

Against all this accumulation of official information and executive asseveration there rests only the vague, indefinite innuendoes of Senator Gorman and his colleagues, not proceeding even to the length of positive assertion, but always presented in the form of a question, intimating rather than charging wrongdoing.

The democrats, with Mr. Gorman at their head, have asserted that they would not oppose the canal if the administration could produce a clean bill of health. President Roosevelt has furnished the assurance demanded. Senator Foraker of the committee on foreign relations expressed the belief that the democrats would not be able to find further fault with the treaty, but that they would be forced to denounce the treaty or be held accountable by the country.
