

FIGHT KEEPS UP AT SAN DOMINGO

UNITED STATES GUNBOAT NEWPORT PROTECTS PROPERTY.

Government Orders Ports Closed to Trade—Fight Continues with Varying Results—Garrison Only Sufficient to Resist Assault—News from the Interior Is Meager.

San Domingo, Jan. 7.—Minister Powell has notified the government that, with the assistance of the United States gunboat Newport he is prepared to protect American property.

The government has issued a decree closing the ports of Azua de Compostilla, San Pedro de Macoris, Samana, Sanchez, Porto Plata and Monte Cristi to take effect within twenty days in the case of vessels coming from the Antilles, within thirty days for vessels from American ports and within forty-five days for vessels from European ports. Armed schooners will guard the closed ports.

A launch belonging to the Newport with a detachment of marines and quick-firing guns, is patrolling the Ozama river. Neither the government nor the insurgents have any money. On different occasions both the government and the insurgents have bombarded and captured Macoris.

Attacks on the city by the insurgents were frequent and several non-combatants have been killed. The rebels are not likely to capture the city by assault. The garrison consists of 500 regular troops and 500 volunteers. The insurgents number 3,000 and their number is increasing. The government army is not strong enough to make a sortie, but is sufficiently strong to prevent a successful attack.

The gunboat Independencia arrived Saturday with two captured Dominican schooner munitions of war for coast defense.

The Independencia bombarded the suburbs yesterday to drive out the revolutionists. San Cristobal have been taken by government troops.

There was a severe attack on the city last night, but the troops repulsed the revolutionists. News from the interior cannot be obtained.

A WRECK IN THE HILLS

Passenger Train on the Burlington Fell Thru a Bridge—Nine Persons Injured.

Deadwood, S. D., Jan. 7.—The Burlington passenger train that left Deadwood at 4 yesterday afternoon crashed through a bridge at Rochford, thirty miles from Deadwood, and nine persons were injured, several seriously. The locomotive and baggage car passed over safely, but the chair car plunged into Little Rapid creek and the Pullman rolled down the bank. The following persons were injured: Paul Klemm of Custer, badly injured, unconscious. W. C. Lilley of Lead, hurt in the head, not serious. W. C. Stebbins, Grand Rapids, Mich., cut on the head and slightly bruised. J. C. McJannet, Lead, leg bruised. Rev. J. A. Sutton, Baptist minister, Deadwood, bruised on face and body. Miss Eva Wilson, Mill, S. D., badly injured in the back. Conductor Cotant, shoulder dislocated. L. V. Seals, Billings, Mont., and A. J. Harrison, Rapid City, bruised. Relief trains were made up at Deadwood, Lead, Hill City and Custer, carrying all the doctors and nurses available.

GREETINGS FOR BRYAN

Tammany Organizes Reception Committee to Wait on the Commoner. New York, Jan. 7.—A reception committee has been organized to greet William Jennings Bryan when he arrives on the Celtic. He will be escorted to his hotel, where a reception will be held. Mr. Bryan has been charged. Associated with him are Samuel Seabury, Charles A. Towne, Henry George, Robert Stewart and Henry B. Maurer. Some of those on the reception committee are Senator Patrick H. McCort, James D. Bell, chairman of the Kings county democratic organization; Police Commissioner McArdoo and Controller of the city, all members of Tammany hall. The committee in their capacity as hosts, Mr. Bryan, while abroad, has conducted himself in receiving the greetings of foreigners with a propriety and felicity that reflects credit upon him.

GIVE UP THEIR STOCK

Carnegie Employees Say They Can't Pay for It on Reduced Wages. New York Special Service. New York, N. Y., Jan. 7.—Because their wages had been reduced from 10 to 12 per cent over 3,000 employees of the National Tube works of this city and the Carnegie Steel works at Homestead, Bradfocock and Duquesne, who held from two to three shares of United States Steel stock, have surrendered their claims on the certificates subscribed for and have requested that the amounts paid by them on the stock be refunded. The mill workers claim that with the wages they are compelled to work for it is impossible to keep up the payments on the stock.

BOGUS PRINCE ARRESTED

Former Husband of Countess Russell in Jail at Toronto. Toronto, Ont., Jan. 7.—An inmate of the jail under the name of Archibald Edward Stuart has been partially identified as William Brown, the coachman who had posed as a foreign prince in England not long ago, married the Countess Russell. He is charged with vagrancy owing to failure to pay bills incurred while living here as a pretended nobleman. The Countess divorced the coachman upon learning his true character. Stuart has been in Toronto a month.

EXPLOSION ON CRUISER

Forty-three Persons Are Either Killed or Injured. Sydney, N. S. W., Jan. 7.—The loss of life on board the British cruiser Wallaroo by the explosion of one of her boilers was not so great as first reported. The number of men killed and injured is forty-three. The first reports said that forty-three men had been killed.

NEW 'PHONE COMPANY

Nine Citizens of Estherville Ask the Council for a Franchise. Estherville, Iowa, Jan. 7.—Nine of the leading citizens of Estherville have formed an independent telephone company and have petitioned the city council for a permit to build, operate and maintain an independent system in Estherville. The new company expects to extend its lines to the rural districts and to connect with other lines on all sides of Estherville. It has plenty of capital behind it.

TRUST RAISES PRICES

Optical Trust Increases Price of Its Goods From 5 to 100 Per Cent. New York Special Service. New York, Jan. 7.—Persons who buy eyeglasses and spectacles this year will pay a great deal more for them than they would have done if they had bought in 1902. Two big advances have been made in all lines of optical goods within the last two months by concerns which control the entire manufacture of such goods in the United States. It is the first time in twenty years that manufacturers have increased the wholesale price of these articles. The first advance came on Nov. 1. Wholesalers and jobbers all over the country had making out new price lists to send to the trade. Five big concerns in the United States control 90 per cent of the output.
