

GEN. REYES WILL LEAVE STATE CAPITOL. PLEA FOR LIFE OF NELSON BOYS

SPECIAL MINISTER OF COLOMBIA CALLS ON SECRETARY HAY, BUT HIS ERRAND IS FRUITLESS. SENATOR LORD ASKS PARDON BOARD FOR COMMUTATION. He Urges the Youth of the Condemned and the Flaws in Evidence as Arguments Against Death Sentence—King and Norbeck Applications Heard.

Senator Samuel Lord of Kansas, of counsel for Charles and Henry Nelson, made an eloquent appeal this afternoon to the state board of pardons for commutation of their death sentences. He urged the youth of the condemned, and maintained that the evidence at the trial and affidavits made subsequently, presented a "reasonable doubt" of the boys' guilt.

RELIEVES VAN DUZEE "Minnesota in the Spanish War" to Be Compiled by Clerk. Colonel C. A. Van Duzee of St. Paul, chosen historian of "Minnesota in the Spanish War" by the state commission, has been relieved, owing to a change in the plan. The commission, which consists of the adjutant general and the colonels of the four regiments which served in that war, has \$2,500 to spend. It first decided to compile and issue an elaborate history, but then chose Colonel Van Duzee as historian at \$50 a month. At a meeting Saturday night it was decided to compile the history from the officers' official records at the adjutant general's office. As this is practically clerical work, Colonel Van Duzee did not care to handle it. It was decided to employ a stenographer at \$15 a month to do the necessary copying.

STARVED HIS PIGEONS Adrian Man Pays \$10 for Cruelty to His Covey. T. J. Kilpatrick, a justice of the peace at Adrian, fined Ferdinand Esser \$10 for starving a hundred pigeons and nine geese. He sent the fine to the adjutant general, who turned it over to the Minnesota Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, as the law directs. Where there is a focal bird in the society, it receives such fines.

ROAD AND BRIDGE MONEY. The state auditor has received \$25,103.87 from the federal government for the state road and bridge fund. It accrued from the 5 per cent of proceeds from the sale of public lands in the state during the year ending June 30, as the law requires. Another item of \$3,750 was received for the university, being the quarterly payment under the Hatch bill.

MISCEGENATION Virginia Law Serves as Model for Proposed Act in South Africa. New York Sun Special Service. Richmond, Va., Jan. 11.—A crusade against the intermarriage of whites and blacks is about to begin in South Africa by aid of the Virginia law, which forbids such unions. The request came from H. Colendrander, a magistrate at Durban, who will wage a fight against miscegenation in his community. His request to the assistant clerk of the house of delegates, which was instantly complied with, was as follows: Magistrate's Department, Durban, Natal, South Africa, Nov. 10, 1903.—Thomas Blegger, Esq., Richmond, Va.—Sir: A mutual friend of ours, Mr. W. M. Kilham, has suggested with some understanding that in your state a law exists prohibiting marriage between whites and blacks. If this is so, I shall be extremely obliged if you will kindly obtain and send me a copy of the statute on this question. I desire to start a crusade against such marriages here. Thanking you in anticipation, believe me, yours faithfully, H. Colendrander, Magistrate.

POSTAL SCANDAL IN COURT Machen, the Groffs and Others Placed on Trial at Washington. Washington, Jan. 11.—August W. Machen, Diller B. Groff, Samuel A. Groff of Washington, D. C., and Dr. and Mrs. George E. Lorenz of Toledo, Ohio, indicted in connection with the postoffice investigation, were placed on trial today on an indictment charging conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the sale of letter box fasteners. After formal denunciations to the indictment were entered and overruled, they were arraigned and pleaded not guilty. The work of securing a jury was then begun. A subpoena has been issued for George W. Beavers, who is wanted as a witness for the government in connection with the trial of these cases.
