PLAN TO FORM HOCKEY LEAGUE

HARRIET TEAM TAKES THE INITIATIVE IN THE MOVEMENT.

Project Contemplates the Construction of a Covered Rink for Practice and Match Games—Ten Teams Are Expected to Join the League.

The Harriet Hockey team has taken the initiative in a movement for the organization of a Minneapolis hockey league, with a view to the construction of a covered rink for practice and match games. The project has been agitated considerably this winter, and enthusiasm in regard to the sport is increasing rapidly. At a meeting of the Harriet club last night the members unanimously agreed to call a meeting in the near future of all the hockey teams in the city, with a view to the organization of a league. With the large number of hockey clubs already in existence in the city, it is believed that a well equipped covered rink can be built next winter at a small expense to each club. This project is distinct from the plan for a rink to be built on the new pavilion at Lake Harriet.

The great Canadian game has gained favor rapidly in the last year, and there is no doubt that the movement started by the Harriets will be successful, and that next winter the enthusiasts will have a good rink for practice and match games. Hockey is one of the swiftest, most graceful, and most fascinating games in existence, and it contains a snap and a sting of roughness which makes it extremely exciting for the spectators. The interest shown in the game is testified by the crowds which have attended the Sunday and holiday games this year between the various teams. In spite of the cold, disagreeable weather Christmas and New Year's days, more than 100 persons witnessed the games at Lake Harriet on each of those days.

There are now about a dozen regular organized teams in Minneapolis, enough to make up a strong league. These include the Knick-Knacks, one of the strongest teams in the state, the Harriets, the Lake Shores of Lake Calhoun, the St. Anthony Park, Crocus Hills, Glens, and the teams of the Central, North, South and East high schools. The Harriet second team, which has shown good form, also will enter the league under a new name.
