BADGERS WON'T PLAY US

WISCONSIN CALLS OFF MINNESOTA GAME FORESEEING SURE DEFEAT AT HANDS OF GOPHERS.

Madison, Wis., Jan. 15.—The University of Wisconsin basketball team will not entertain the University of Minnesota team this month according to schedule, but will try to brace up and take a trip to Chicago in March. The gopher team was dated to come to Madison for a game Jan. 29 and it was hoped that Wisconsin could improve enough to defeat the Minnesota people, thus making up for the defeat the badgers suffered at Minneapolis a year ago.
The reason for cancelling the Minnesota game is the feeling that sure defeat would result from a contest with the gophers. It is given out that Captain Schofield of the badger team is too sick to play and that interest in basketball has slumped at Madison.
A trip to Chicago is planned for the middle of March. A game with the Lewis institute team is arranged for March 19, one with Wheaton college March 11, and on the way home to Madison one with the Milwaukee Foresters March 12. A game with the St.

Johns Military academy team is negotiated for next Saturday.

The South High school girls basketball team will meet St. Paul Central High to-morrow evening at Lyndale Congregational church gymnasium in this city. This is the first championship game for South High. The teams will line up as follows:

D. A. Packard of Denver, "Kid" Nichols of Kansas City, "Bill" Rourke of Omaha and President Seaton, manager of the Western Baseball league, are in Sioux City to-day canvassing the Sioux City situation with reference to putting a team there. The league wants the town, but Sioux City people have not been able to secure the necessary guarantee of backing. LOU WILL TRY IT AGAIN

CHAMPION TROTTER WILL GO AFTER MAUD S.' RECORD, USING DEAD QUEEN'S SULKY.

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 15.—"It will be at least May before we drive Lou Dillon a mile in as good as 2:20," said Millard Sanders, the man who has so successfully handled the trotting champion owned by C. K. G. Billings.
"About midsummer, however, Lou will be ready to go against the high-wheel mark again, and my money is ready for anyone that she will turn the mile in better than 2:05, the time she made when we sent her after Maud S.' 2:08 1/2, a record which has since been rejected by the powers that be."
"I believe that the world is fully convinced that the trotting fathers made a mistake in declaring that Lou did not lower Maud S.' mile," continued Sanders. "I am also under the impression that a majority of present day trotting horsemen believe Lou is faster in every hitch than was Maud S." For these reasons I do not take the decision of the trotting board seriously.
"But at the proper time we are going to show the old men of the trotting board that they made a mistake in wiping out Lou's high-wheel sulky mile. That is, if the heirs to the Bonner estate will allow us."
"It is Mr. Billings' intention to ask the Bonners for the loan of Maud S.' sulky. I don't suppose they will re-

fuse, as I have for years, like other trotting horsemen, been under the impression that they offer a standing reward of \$5,000 for the driver of any trotter who lowers Maud S.' mark un-

der similar conditions, and with a similar sulky.
"If the loan of the sulky is made, a trial will be made at Glenwood, where Maud S. trotted to her record."
