where two come from the same state, is slated for a place on the platform committee. This committee is made up of forty-five members, or one from each state. As soon as it meets it always selects a sub-committee of perhaps a dozen members, which monopolizes the work of writing the national platform.

Certain republican senators who are really indifferent about attending the convention as delegates are being quietly told that it will be wise for them to attend, else the impression may gain ground among their colleagues that they have lost prestige at home.

The Situation Analyzed.

I had an interesting talk recently with very prominent Minnesotans regarding this question of senatorial influence dominating national conventions. He calls attention to the fact that it is a distinct departure from the ideas of the founders of the government, who wanted a complete separation between the three co-ordinate departments.

History of Senatorial Participation.

Turning to the reports of the national republican convention, as compiled by Colonel C. W. Johnson of Minneapolis, for a long time secretary of the senate, I find that during the early years of the party, and in fact up to and including 1850, senators were not greatly in evidence in the quadrennial party gathering.

The Philadelphia Convention.

"The Philadelphia convention of 1800, for evidence of the national convention as delegates. Senator Hanna, as chairman of the republican national committee, had the honor of writing to order. Senator Wolcott, of Colorado, was elected temporary chairman. Senator Lodge of Massachusetts was elected permanent chairman. Senator Foraker of Ohio nominated McKinley, and Senator Thurston of Nebraska seconded the nomination of McKinley.

"As we all know, each of the great national conventions of each party is run by not to exceed a dozen or fifteen men. This combination of a committee which has been established at Philadelphia, and which I confidently expect to be followed at Chicago, these dozen or fifteen men will be the United States senators. If our senators go as delegates, they will be a part of the controlling force of the convention; if they do not, they will have nothing to say, or do, except to vote 'aye' on all policies which this committee has agreed to."

The Minnesota Senators.

"But do our senators want to go as delegates?" I asked. "I think not," was the reply. "In fact, I think I know that they would rather not go. They believe that these positions of honor should be divided between the faithful party workers at home. But at the same time, the pressure to have our senators go as delegates will be exerted with greatadroitness in Washington. Members of the senate from other states who are planning to go will be introduced and every other means at their command seek to create the impression that if our senators do not go they will lose standing in the senate. Then, there is the question at home, of whether they can be left out without creating the impression that they have been run down. Personally, I am sure that they care nothing about being delegates, and yet the stress of circumstances may make them candidates, and if it does, it will not be possible to defeat them."

"Do you think the senatorial attendance at the Chicago convention, which promises largely to exceed that at Philadelphia, will mean anything against the candidacy of President Roosevelt?" "Certainly will, if the opportunity presents itself. As a body, the republican senators do not like the president, and would like to prevent his nomination. Obstinately, however, they would not openly oppose him unless given a good opportunity. But you let the opportunity present itself, and I am a poor prophet if it isn't improved to the limit."
