MACHEN MADE MONEY. Managed to Accumulate \$20,000 a Year with \$3,500 Salary. Washington, Jan. 22.—Conrad Holmes, counsel for the government in the post-office conspiracy case, called attention yesterday to the fact, as disclosed by Machen's bank accounts, that he managed to save \$20,000 a year on a salary of \$3,500. This brought forth a storm of protest from counsel for the defense, who appealed to the court to let the defendant, Machen, be tried on only one charge at a time.
