

STANDS UP FOR ROCKEFELLER

CHANCELLOR E. BENJ. ANDREWS
BLAMES MISS TARBELL.

Says the Standard Oil Prince Gives
Much More in Secret Than in Public,
and Is a "Cruelly Misrepresented
Man"—Truth Will Come Out Some
Day—Sincerity of Rockefeller.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 25.—In an interview
to-day, which was prompted by news-
paper opposition to the acceptance of a
gift by John D. Rockefeller to the uni-
versity, the chancellor of that institution,
E. Benjamin Andrews, said:
"I know that Mr. Rockefeller is a cruelly
misrepresented man. Miss Tarbell's
articles running in McClure's Magazine
are baseless and unjust. There are more
distortion and perversion in them than in
any series I have ever read. The facts
will be told some time from Mr. Rocke-
feller's standpoint, and when they are
Miss Tarbell, I believe, will be sorry for
what she has done."
"I am well acquainted with Mr. Rocke-
feller. I feel sure I know him better
than Miss Tarbell does. I have known
him since 1876. He is a man of tremen-
dous brain force. I consider him the
greatest business man in the United
States. Pierpont Morgan is a pigmy com-
pared with him."
"When it is charged that Mr. Rocke-
feller's religious pretensions are insin-
cere, I deny it. I know him as an
earnest and devoutly religious man. The
amount that Mr. Rockefeller gives away
secretly is much more than he bestows
publicly. He has used me several times
as an instrument in his charities. I do
not consider him at all a man unworthy
to be honored."

JAIL BREAKERS FOILED

AFTER MURDEROUSLY ASSAULT-
ING WARDEN AND WATCHMEN
THEY ARE HELD UP BY A
WOMAN.

Norristown, Pa., Jan. 25.—Warden
Abraham Gotwals and Night Watch-
man Samuel Beckwith of the Mont-
gomery county jail were murderously
assaulted by two prisoners, who failed
in a desperate attempt to escape.
Beckwith was so severely injured
that he had to be taken to the
Charity hospital. The warden has a
half dozen wounds on the head, none
serious.
The noise aroused others in the jail.
Mrs. Gotwals ran into the corridor
with an unloaded revolver and met
the prisoners on the way to the gate.
She pointed her weapon at them and
ordered them to return to their cells.
This, with the screams of Mrs. Got-
wals' 15-year-old daughter,
frightened the men and they re-
turned.
The warden revived enough to tele-
phone for the police. In the mean-
time the two escaped men were trying
the exits. When Chief of Police
Rodebaugh arrived and told them to
throw up their hands they readily did
so, begging for mercy.
