## RAILROADS.

### STICKNEY PLAN NOT A SUCCESS

#### THE GREAT CENTRAL TRANSFER YARD WITHOUT BUSINESS.

Railroads Centering in Chicago Have Not Taken to the Plan—Yards May Be Abandoned—More Than \$5,000,000 Spent on the Enterprise.

Special to The Journal. Chicago, Jan. 25.—After working five years to open the field for a great clearing yard to receive and discharge made-up trains of different roads, the company back of the plan is now without any business, and it is reported here that the yard may be abandoned. The great yards of the company at Stickney, just outside the city limits, represent an expenditure of over \$5,000,000. The yard has been finished and ready for traffic for two or three years, yet the president of the company says not a railway entering Chicago has contracted to use it.

The Union Transfer Clearing yard is the outgrowth of the Stickney Clearing yard, a dream of President Stickney of the Great Central, conceived by the lawyer railroad president during the world's fair. The idea was to save to initial lines the cost of switching cars destined to other roads, as well as the expense of belt railroad charges. The original scheme was for a circular railroad yard. A train would be run around the outer circle of tracks and cars for different roads dropped on tracks in the circle. When a train had made the circuit of the yard every car would have been disposed of and the original yard would be ready to receive cars of the transportation companies ever went into the scheme. As the idea provided for the clearing of cars destined for other roads, the yards could not succeed unless all lines entering the city went into it. If the project had succeeded it would have practically closed every railroad freight yard in the city, and saved the individual lines great sums annually.

A twin city transportation club is planned by the lines of the Detroit and Pittsburgh clubs. There are insurance and social clubs, which have informal suppers several times a year, to give the railway men a better acquaintance. P. D. Lyons, district passenger agent of the Rock Island in Minneapolis, came from Detroit and is a promoter of the proposed organization. The Detroit club has over 200 members, including employees from general agents down to ticket clerks. It is expected that the Northern in Minneapolis and St. Paul will join.

#### New Steamer in Commission.

The Canadian Pacific has put in commission the fine new Clyde-built steamer Princess Beatrice, which will run between Victoria and Seattle. It will give a service similar to that of the Puget Sound Navigation Company's steamer, which sank lately. The steamer will leave Victoria at night, arriving at Seattle in the morning. Returning, the boat will leave Seattle in the morning, arriving in Victoria at night.

#### North-Western Hauls Much Ore.

Iron Mountain, Mich., Jan. 25.—The Chicago & North-Western railroad is the largest single hauler of iron ore in the world. It has docks at Escanaba, on Lake Michigan and at Ashland, Lake Superior, and last year brought to those points an aggregate of 5,700,000 tons. For this it received in freights about \$2,300,000. The Duluth & Iron Range and the Duluth, Missoula and Northern both exceed it in gross net receipts, as they haul over a greater distance and receive more per ton. Their combined haul was 10,500,000 tons and their receipts were alone during the year was \$7,700,000. These two roads belong to the United States steel corporation.

## GOOD ROAD LEGISLATION

### NATIONAL ASSOCIATION TO URGE PASSAGE OF BILL EXTENDING GOVERNMENT AID.

Washington, Jan. 25.—A meeting of the National Good Roads association has been called to meet in this city at the Raleigh hotel to-day, continuing to-morrow and Wednesday, the principal object of the meeting being to urge members to attend hearings before the house and senate committees on agriculture. A large number of prominent men from all over the country are expected to be in attendance.

Two bills are now pending before congress extending government aid to the construction of good roads. One of them is known as the Latimer bill, introduced by Senator Latimer, of South Carolina, and the other is the Brownlow-Gallinger bill, introduced in the house by Representative Brownlow, of Tennessee, and in the senate by Senator Gallinger, of New Hampshire. The non-partisan character of these bills is shown by the fact that one was presented by a democrat, and the other by republicans.

The legislator of a number of states, some democratic and some republican, have endorsed the movement and instructed their senators and members to support whichever bill they consider the better. While the bills differ somewhat in detail the principle is the same—that where a county or state appropriates money to be expended in improving its roads the government shall allot an equal sum for such improvements on condition that the roads shall be constructed under the supervision of the government and shall thereafter be maintained by the state or county constructing the same.

The Latimer and Brownlow bills propose that up to the extent of \$16,000,000 per year, for three years, the expense shall be divided between the general government and the state or local government, so that where a state now appropriates \$300,000 for
