Eldora, Iowa, Jan. 28.—The defense in the Blydenburgh murder trial occupied most of the day in the introduction of expert testimony in an effort to prove that the presence of arsenical poisoning in the organs of the dead woman might have been produced by the embalming fluid used.

Professor Vaughn is here to-day and will bring exhibits of Mrs. Blydenburgh's organs into court. The defense feels that it scored heavily with the testimony of Dr. N. C. Morse, which was admitted yesterday.

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RUSSIA AIMS TO FEED THE ORIENT

FERTILE FIELDS OF MANCHURIA TO GROW WHEAT.

Report of United States Consul at Niuchwang Shows Considerable Progress Is Being Made—American Grain Will Hardly Be Needed in a Short Time—Plows and Farm Machinery Are Required.

Washington, Jan. 28.—One of the most interesting and important consular reports of recent years, concerning the outlook for the flour trade in Manchuria, has been made, under a late date, to the secretary of commerce and labor by Henry B. Miller, consul at Niuchwang, China.

Mr. Miller is not an optimist regarding the American flour trade in the Chinese orient; but he believes the demand for American mill machinery is likely to improve.

One of the factors against the extension of the American flour trade in the Chinese Eastern railway, the southeastern branch of the great Siberian railway, in its course thru the Liao river valley, southern Manchuria, it passes 1,000 of agricultural country as rich as is found anywhere.


NEW DIRECTORY OUT. Winnipeg's Gain in Population in 1903 Was 13,744.

Special to The Journal. Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 28.—The first copies of the Winnipeg directory for 1904 were issued this afternoon. The total population of the city is placed at 77,304, an increase over 1903 of 13,744. In 1881 the estimated population was 8,408, and in 1891, 28,666. In 1901 the figures reached 52,443. The increase the past year is the largest of any one year in the history of Winnipeg.

EXPORTS INCREASE. The Figures Last Year Show a Gain of \$124,000,000.

New York, Jan. 28.—Of a total of \$24,000,000 increase in last year's export trade, \$93,700,000 came from agricultural products and \$88,000,000 from this from raw cotton goods which fell below only one other year, 1900, in the country's history, and was considerably more than double the substantial export of such commodities as lately as 1897. Imports of manufactured goods last year increased faster than imports of raw materials. The country's export trade last year increased in every direction, except to Asia and Africa.
