Yesterday was the first day since the cold snap that the mercury ventured to start out cars loaded with perishable goods.

The weather bureau forecasts snow to-night and Saturday and colder Saturday. Section Observer Cramm does not think the mercury will reach the zero mark. The mails are arriving nearer on time, the train furthest off schedule being two hours and forty-five minutes late.

CHINESE NEWS.

YEAR COMING ARE ATTRACTIVE

CELESTIALS WILL CELEBRATE BEGINNING ON FEB. 18.

Old Grudges Will Be Temporarily Forgotten, Visits Will Be Exchanged and Gifts Will Be Showered—Big Feast Day Comes on Feb. 17.

New Year is coming in a few weeks in Minneapolis and all over the country. This may seem strange in light of the facts that the insurance companies and patent medicine dealers have nearly finished distributing calendars for 1904, but it is true, nevertheless. The celebration will not be generally observed by the residents of Minneapolis, but every citizen of Chinese birth is looking toward it with pleasure.

The Chinese New Year falls on Feb. 18 this year. There are more than 100 celestials in Minneapolis and all of them are getting ready for the holiday. Boxes of delicacies are arriving, but none is opened. They are carefully stored away to await the festive time when the Gaiety of rice wine are in storage, and not until Feb. 17 will the cork be begun to fly.

The day of days is Feb. 17, or the day before the Chinese New Year opens. On this day, wherever two or three celestials are gathered together there is a feast. The banquet board is laid and the guests are invited until he is thoroughly satisfied. The following day, New Year's, is a fast day. The "heavy delicacies" being put away and only plain fare of vegetables is allowed. At 6 o'clock the first salute of firecrackers begins. This is continued hourly until 6 o'clock in the evening.

The Chinese pay visits from store to store and from laundry to laundry. Social lines are loosely drawn, the business men among the Celestials exchanging their visits with themselves, while those in the humbler walks of life forego their own visits. Every visitor is presented with a gift of some kind, such as cakes, fruits and wines. The visitor leaves his store and makes the rounds of the houses of his friends.

As he has called on all of them he returns home, throws open his house and his friends flock in. It is the season of "great happiness" for the participants.

The wine is springily handled. When the average American of blubulous tendencies starts out to celebrate the New Year he imbues several bottles of champagne down his throat without holding on. With the Chinaman it is different. The festivities last for a week, or two weeks, or more and no one gets drunk.

On New Year's Day the Chinaman temporarily forgives all injuries and regards every man as his friend. After the first day of the festival and hates are taken up with a cheerfulness peculiar to the Oriental nature. The celebration continues as long as supplies or conditions permit. They endure a month or may come to a close within a week.

The customs and etiquette of the Chinese New Year are preserved as nearly as possible in the several temples of the celebration in Minneapolis. In Minneapolis there will be no visits to joss houses, or processions in honor of the various deities.
