Scientific Men Advance a Novel Reason for the National Characteristic—Legs Are Too Short.

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Why are the Japanese undersized? Because they don't use chairs. That is the answer to the conundrum given by a number of Japanese army surgeons and scientific men.

Among the Japanese coolies, who spend much of their time running in the open, the legs are noticeably longer than in the more sedentary classes. It is believed that the general use of tables and chairs in the empire of the mikado would eventually result in adding several inches to the average height of Japanese soldiers, which is, at present, 5 feet and 4 inches.
