WHY LUMBERMEN ARE IN A SWEAT

Canadians Want a Duty or Anything That Will Keep Out the American Product.

Greater Part of Their Trade Goes to the States—Policy of the C. P. R. R.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 16.—Canadian lumbermen are casting about in all directions for a policy which will enable them to compete with the Puget Sound manufacturers in supplying the northwest with lumber. The American lumber dealers have so completely captured the trade which once belonged largely to the Canadians themselves, and formed so large a part of their market, that the lumber industry in British Columbia is absolutely demoralized. The announcement of the Canadian Pacific Railway company that it might enter the manufacturing of lumber to supply the settlers along its line has complicated the situation. So serious is the situation that the province that the big lumbermen see no relief unless the Canadian government imposes a duty that will keep out the American product, which seems unlikely at this time. The lumbermen have made a complaint that the rail rates on lumber from Puget sound points into the northwest were so much lower than the tariffs on the Canadian side, that the advantage was greatly in favor of the Americans, but this has been found untrue. On the other hand, the American manufacturers considering shipping lumber into British Columbia by water to take advantage of the lower Canadian rates. The lumbermen of the northwest were a country in process of such rapid settlement, is one of the great factors in disposing of the lumber product. It is only now that the American manufacturers have invaded the northwest and taken from the Canadians the greater part of the trade. Several meetings are planned of the dissatisfied Canadian interests.

Why the C. P. R. Is Concerned.

As the Washington lumber trade grew the Canadian Pacific began to take an interest in the fight, for the American product is hauled only a comparatively short distance, if at all, over its lines. The proportions of this decrease seriously affected the business of the Canadian road, until the officers made known the possibility that the company itself would enter the lumber manufacturing business, making use of its immense timber limits for the Canadian Pacific as the largest owner of timber in Canada. The railway's announcement was looked on as a bluff by the lumbermen, who immediately offered to sell their interests at cost. But the railway evidently was in earnest. The general belief in British Columbia is that the government will not permit the Canadian Pacific to enter extensively into the lumber trade, or at least that a monopoly would not be tolerated.

THE CAPITAL IN NAME

JUNEAU WILL HAVE A REPRESENTATIVE IN WASHINGTON SOON TO URGE HER CLAIMS.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 16.—Juneau is almost the capital of Alaska, but not quite so, and her citizens are to make an effort to overcome the claims of Sitka before the present session of congress. Sitka is the old capital, and it is there that Governor Brady and one or two other officials still reside. The government officials, the courts and other representatives of the government have moved to Juneau. In fact, the promise has been made to Juneau that it may become the capital in name as well as in fact as soon as provision is made to receive the governor and all the officers. Juneau is to send a representative to Washington to urge congress that the time has come to make the transfer of the capital complete. Juneau is a more accessible place than Sitka, as it is in the track of all the southeastern Alaska steamships. Governor Brady, who owns a sawmill at Sitka and has other interests there, it is said, will never change his official abode, but his term expires this year and he is not likely to seek re-election.

THE STOCK PAYS WELL

JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER HAS MADE \$100,000,000 IN OIL DIVIDENDS IN SEVEN YEARS.

New York, Feb. 16.—The declaration of a \$16 per share dividend by the Standard Oil company for the current quarter came as a surprise to many in Wall street. It was believed the high price of oil would result in the payment of the same dividend as in the corresponding quarter of last year, which was \$20.

Since 1897 the Standard Oil company has declared dividends aggregating \$297,000,000, an amount equivalent to about three times the capital stock. It is reported that John D. Rockefeller owns 33 per cent of the stock. If this estimate is correct, Mr. Rockefeller's income from the Standard Oil company in a little over seven years is in the neighborhood of \$100,000,000.

QUARRELED OVER CARDS

Saloonkeeper Murdered by Enraged Patron at Stanford, Mont.

Helena, Mont., Feb. 15.—Harry Cook, a sheepherder, shot and instantly killed Joseph Vander, a saloonkeeper at Stanford, in the evening according to a special from Lewistown. The men, it seems, had a quarrel over a game of cards. Cook left the saloon in a rage, swearing that he would get his rifle and kill the whole crowd.

Shortly afterward he returned armed with a rifle, and the saloon was quickly emptied. Vander, being the last man to leave, was shot as he was going out a side door, and died instantly. Cook then started for another saloon, intending to clean that out, too, but was held with a blow on the head and placed under arrest.

MORE GOVERNMENT FARMS

Two-Thirds of the Shoshone Reserve to Be Opened.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Feb. 16.—An agent in the interior department has left Washington for the Wind River reservation, Wyoming, where he will treat with the Shoshone Indians for about two-thirds of the reservation. The government will purchase the land and throw it open to settlement, probably before the end of the year.

TOLD IN A LINE

Pittsburg—Thermometers registered from 5 to 10 degrees below zero in and about Pittsburg today.

St. Louis—The funeral of Wm. J. Lemp, the millionaire brewer-soldier, was held yesterday afternoon.

Detroit—Last night was the coldest of the winter in the lower peninsula of Michigan. The thermometer showed 9.1 below zero.

Chicago—The death roll of the Ingotrope disaster has been increased by the demise of Leo Pihlaks, a musician employed at the theater.

Cleveland—This was the coldest day in Cleveland and northern Ohio in five years. The government thermometer recorded 8 degrees below zero.

New York—A fast ferry line to Staten Island is to be established under municipal control. Nearly \$5,000,000 will be spent in building boats and constructing terminals.

New York—A section of wall of a building in

course of construction fell, precipitating three workmen to the ground, thirteen stories below. They were killed instantly.

New York—Frank Bartunek shot and killed his wife Hester at his home here, shot and seriously wounded his stepson, Vincent Horrick, and then committed suicide.

Cincinnati—The Methodist book committee has decided to recommend to the general conference the consolidation of the Cincinnati, the Chicago and the New York book concerns.

Niagara Falls, N. Y.—The ice bridge and ice mountain at the falls have reached unusual proportions. The mountain has approached to within twenty-five feet of the crest of the cataract.

Syracuse, N. Y.—A fierce snow storm is raging all thru this section of the state. The thermometer in Syracuse was 15 degrees below zero during the night. All trains are several hours late.

Norfolk, Neb.—Walter King, a well-known young man, disappeared two months ago. Today his body was found in the refrigerating room of a creamery. Winding up a drunken spree, he had entered the room and was locked in by a

spring lock. He was unable to escape and froze to death.

Chicago—President E. D. Eaton of Beloit college has announced that plans have been prepared and approved, and the contract let for the erection of a \$50,000 library, the gift of Andrew Carnegie.

New York—A piercing wind today added to the discomfort in this city. At 3 o'clock the official record showed one degree above zero. Big ice cakes in both rivers hampered the ferry service greatly during the day.
