MINNESOTA SWANVILLE REITERATES

IT HAS GOLD AND OTHER PRECIOUS ORES. Old Miners and Prospectors Back Up Its Claims and Assert that Successful Mining is Assured—Some of the Latest Discoveries—The Usual Rush of Gold Seekers Expected in the Spring.

Special to the Journal. Swanville, Minn., Feb. 17.—Prospecting for gold and copper continued in the hills of this village as well as in the beds of Irish creek and several other small streams and springs in the neighborhood, and the presence of these metals, as well as silver and zinc, is almost daily being verified.

Several old miners and prospectors have proved beyond the question of a doubt that these metals are in sufficient quantities for successful mining. They believe that rich placer mining for gold will be opened up in Irish creek, a small tributary of the main stream, about two miles north of this village, and at several large springs near Bass lake, in the Pine Lake neighborhood, as soon as spring breaks. These veins are rich in silver and pay ore will be found in the hills as soon as the weather will permit of sinking shafts, as outcroppings plainly indicate the presence of ledges in several places.

At the Olaf Johnson mine, at Pine Lake, work on a six-foot shaft is already in progress, but the severe weather makes it slow, and it is probable that little can be done for another six weeks. Gold in the Creek. The late discoveries at Irish Creek have caused much excitement, as appearances indicate that the stream is full of gold, and furthermore that some of the hills at the head of the creek, some four miles north of here, there is exceedingly rich gold and silver ore. This is proven by the fact of the quantities of rich floats, being taken from the stream near its junction with Swan river, supposedly brought there by the ice during spring freshets. One large chunk of black ore, completely threaded with silver seams, was found a few days ago, and innumerable smaller pieces are being found almost daily. Another piece, weighing something over a pound, of almost pure silver was similarly found and is now at the News office here. Besides, several persons have washed small quantities of gold in the bed of the creek, and have exhibited almost pure gold dust.

At Bass Lake an old Black Hills miner has been investigating a large spring and opening up a vein of gold in the sand around it, and a quantity of the washed dust, some \$20 worth, has been showing around the village. Midgets Found. At the Carver farm, west of town, a nugget of almost pure gold the size of a hen's egg was found several days ago. Colonel E. B. Wood of Long Prairie, is also exhibiting a large amount of pure gold, which was taken from the crop of a tame duck, purchased from a farmer in the Hill district. Altogether the proof of the existence of valuable minerals deposited here are convincing to all and indications now point to a big rush of gold seekers in the spring.

CASS LAKE, MINN.—Nathan Nollis, postoffice inspector, came here on orders from the department for the purpose of adjusting the matters which were not satisfactory to Postoffice No. 102, at Cass Lake, Minn., and for the removal of the office, which has been maintained in the section of Gardner & Beckett's department store.
