

# RUSSIANS CANCEL AMERICAN ORDERS

## Irritation Against the United States Grows and Merchants Refuse to Buy Goods.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 26.—Irritation against the United States on account of the supposed unfriendly attitude of that country toward Russia seems to become daily more pronounced, caused by the Vicksburg incident at Chemulpho.

The commander of the gunboat on that occasion is said to have refused to unite with the commanders of other foreign warships at Chemulpho to protest against the fighting which resulted in the loss of the Russian warships *Korietz* and *Variag*, and the Vicksburg did not take on board survivors of the Russian ships. American merchants are becoming alarmed at the prospect of loss of Russian trade.

Within the last few days orders for American goods have been inter-manded, the only explanation given being that the prospective purchasers did not desire to buy American goods under the present circumstances.

United States Consul General Watts has been appealed to in the case of an American firm which held a large contract for shoes supplied to the Japanese-Korean treaty. France is thereby required to become the active ally of Russia.

The officials say the situation does not warrant such a conclusion and add that the new treaty does not make the slightest change in the position of the United States.

**BALTIC TO BE CLOSED**

Smaller Powers Will Take Action if England Goes to War.

**KOREANS CHANGE FRONT**

Japanese Refuse Use of Old Palaces as Russians Advance.

Seoul, Feb. 26.—One thousand Russian troops have arrived at Tong-wu and 50 at Ranso. The Korean government has changed front accordingly, in expectation of Japanese reverses and is attempting to ride on the fence. It has refused the use of several old palaces to the Japanese troops.

Several war correspondents started for Ping Yang this afternoon. Forty other correspondents will arrive with the Japanese headquarters staff, which is expected daily. Everything here is held at famine prices. Horses are only procurable at an enormous cost.

All of the Korean telegraph lines have been cut. There is much anxiety felt with regard to the missionaries at Yenchun. According to the latest news, dated Feb. 13, they were short of provisions.

Most Sacred Image Will Accompany Army in Far East.

Moscow, Feb. 26.—The most sacred image in Russia has been sent to St. Petersburg, and it will be taken later to the far east with the army.

This image is a representation of the virgin appearing to Saint Sergius, and it is kept at the Troitzka monastery.

It is about one foot square and it is covered with precious stones. The image accompanied Alexis, Peter the Great and Alexander I. on all their campaigns.

A silver tablet attached to it enumerates the battles at which the idol was present.

**NURSES FOR JAPAN**

Philadelphia Society Will Support Ten Under Dr. McGee.

Philadelphia, Feb. 26.—The Philadelphia branch of the Red Cross society, independent of the national society, will send ten nurses to Japan, in charge of Dr. Anita H. McGee of Washington.

A resolution was adopted binding the local association to raise a fund of \$5,000 by voluntary contributions, on condition that the expedition will go under the auspices of the Philadelphia society. The selection of the nurses will be left to Dr. McGee.

**KAISER AS CZAR'S TOOL**

Germany Used as Whip to Force France into Line.

Paris, Feb. 26.—Those who predict that before the end of the war Russia, Germany and France will be leagued against Japan, England and the United States, are not aware of the bitterness which is gradually increasing between France and Germany as the result of the Kaiser's intrigues in the court of St. Petersburg.

These secret German schemings are intended to decrease the diplomatic importance of the Franco-Russian alliance.

Count von Buelow, the German chancellor, has just denied the existence of German overtures to the czar, but secret correspondence regarding the matter is passing between the Quai d'Orsay and the French embassy at St. Petersburg, while special foreign office official has been detailed to study and deal with the situation. **RUSSIA NOTIFIES HAY**

Will Not Recognize Japanese Protectorate Over Korea.

Washington, Feb. 26.—Russia today served notice on the state department that she will refuse to recognize the agreement between Japan and Korea, by which Japan guarantees the independence and integrity of Korea.

Russia takes the position that the Emperor of Korea entered into the agreement under duress. Russia will continue to regard Korea as a neutral ground, and will assent to no agreement that might stand in the way of seizure of that country by the czar's forces if they are able to take and hold it.

Information as to the exact terms of the agreement is anxiously awaited by Secretary Hay. It is not now known whether it provides for an alliance or merely a protection of the territory of this country has assumed over Panama. Secretary Hay has sounded some of the powers in the question as to whether the agreement will give France sufficient ground for joining forces with Russia, under the terms of their alliance.
