ENGLISH LIBERAL PARTY CONFIDENT

Preparing for Election Within Six Weeks and Expecting Victory.

London, March 4.—The organizers of the liberal party fully expect an early dissolution of parliament and the present government and are preparing for a general election within six weeks.

The difficulties of the present weak cabinet are expected to culminate in a disastrous budget, with increased national expenditures which will even go beyond the record of trade in 1903. When the elections come, the liberals expect an anticonservative wave to bring a majority of liberals and Irish to over 100. In such a case it is predicted that King Edward will call on the Earl of Spencer, liberal leader in the house of lords, to form a new ministry.

MAN SELLS WIFE AND TWO CHILDREN

Court Puts Ban on Transaction—Consideration Only Two Fishing Nets.

Norfolk, Va., March 4.—When John Outlaw of Currituck county, North Carolina, became tired of his wife and two children some weeks ago he sold the trio to his brother, Jerome Outlaw, receiving in exchange two fishing nets. The matter was reported to the authorities and warrants were sworn out.

At their trial it developed that John Outlaw did not think there was anything wrong in the affair. Neither did Mrs. Outlaw nor Jerome Outlaw. When John Outlaw became aware that there was a possibility of the transaction being annulled by court he gathered up his fishing nets and departed.

Jerome and Mrs. Outlaw were found guilty of illegal cohabitation, but as the children are dependent upon them for support no penalty was inflicted.

EMANCIPATION OF SERFS OBSERVED

Russia Officially Celebrates Freeing of Slaves for First Time.

St. Petersburg, March 4.—For the first time since the emancipation of the serfs in 1861 the anniversary was officially observed throughout the empire as a general holiday and with special religious services.

The newspapers took the occasion to review the reforms introduced by Czar Alexander II—who by a stroke of his pen freed 23,000,000 serfs—declaring that the present celebration may be regarded as a turning point in Russian history, marking the recognition of a wider freedom in national life, the realization of which is not far distant, provided the nation properly exerts the influences which have been so unexpectedly united by the war with Japan.

At the big central market of St. Petersburg the crowd of people, the open air, uncovered, joining in the chanting of a Te Deum.

OUTLAW SHOT

Sheriff and His Posse Slay the Terror of Moosejaw, N. W. T. Country.

Special to The Journal. Moosejaw, N. W. T., March 4.—It is reported from Muddy river that a sheriff called on one Jones, an outlaw who has terrorized this section of the country for months, to arrest a man who was working for him for some offense.

The sheriff started with his prisoner and several miles out was overtaken by the outlaw who had pursued them. Jones ordered the sheriff to hold up his hands and then took the sheriff's horse and disarming him, sent him home on foot. Jones then returned to his cabin with the man who had been arrested.

ALBANIANS QUIT FIGHT

Turkey Agrees to Exempt Cattle from Taxation at Ispek.

Saloniki, Macedonia, March 4.—The Albanian insurrectionary movement at Ispek is ended. The government has promised the Albanians exemption from the cattle tax.

Several skirmishes have occurred near Amatova. The insurgent chiefs Apostol and Yevan are strongly entrenched near Gumenje awaiting an attack.

NEW YORK INDORSES ROOSEVELT.

New York, March 4.—Resolutions indorsing President Roosevelt have been adopted by the twenty-seventh assembly republican state committee. The resolutions refer to the fact that the president "has entered upon the trust of a public office."

URUGUAY REBELS DEFEATED.

Montevideo, Uruguay, March 4.—It is officially announced that General Munk, commander of the Uruguayan forces, has routed the troops of the revolutionary leader, Sarriave, at Unk de Quenarcho. The rebels fled, abandoning a number of killed and wounded.

EARTHQUAKE IN PERU.

Lima, Peru, March 4.—A tremendous earthquake, which did much damage, occurred here at 5:20 this morning. Nothing comparable with it had been experienced during the last thirty years.

LOOMIS DEPARTS FOR SAN DOMINGO

President Favors Protectorate Over Island, but Desires to Consult Natives.

New York Sun Special Service. Washington, March 4.—Assistant Secretary Loomis has gone to San Domingo on the Mayflower with Admiral Dewey and the officers of the navy. He will make a thorough investigation of conditions in the revolutionary republic.

On his report will depend the policy of the administration on Santo Domingo affairs. The president favors the establishment of a virtual protectorate over San Domingo as the only means of protecting American interests there and maintaining order, but he hesitates to take such a step without further information as to how it would be received on the island.

Washington, March 4.—Isaac T. Stoddard, secretary of the territory of Arizona, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted, to take effect April 1.

MORMONS FOR CANADIAN WEST

Four Hundred Families From Utah to Migrate to Taber on Crows Nest Road.

Special to The Journal. Winnipeg, March 4.—Arrange ments have been made to bring 400 Mormon families to the Canadian northwest as soon as spring opens. This party, which will include over 2,000 persons, will settle at a place called Taber on the Crows Nest railway, about a hundred miles west of a townsite at Taber and the Canadian Pacific railroad will erect a station. That section has been picked out by the Mormons on account of its fertility and ready access to water.
