USUAL HIGH LICENSE

AN EMBARGO ON PULPWOOD

LOGGERS OF THIS CLASS OF STOCK IN DESPAIR.

Mills in Wisconsin and Michigan are overwhelmed with wood and cars so loaded are delayed for days. Railroads will therefore not supply cars or receive shipments.

Duluth, Minn., March 9.—There is a practical embargo on pulpwood shipment, and loggers who are cutting this class of stock are in despair. Many of them are closing their camps and stopping work; others are hauling to railroad points where they will store the wood until it can be moved.

The trouble arises from the refusal to take wood by all railroads running to Wisconsin and Michigan points, where the pulp mills are located. They say the mills are covered with wood and that it cannot be unloaded, and that cars sent there are delayed longer than the road can afford. They refuse to permit their cars to go on lines running north from here, and if the cars do get into the woods and are loaded they refuse to receive them here. Probably 2,000 cars, perhaps more, could be placed on the line here in twenty-four hours if they could be obtained.

All low grade lumber that is likely to be made at the deerskin mills at the head of the lake this coming season has been sold. There is very little dry stock now on hand unsold, and that little is about all at once. There is no change of moment either way in prices of lumber of any grade.

The mill of the St. Louis Lumber company is closed for the winter, logs not coming in to it fast enough to keep the Alpine constant. Since the mill started for its winter run it has cut 7,000,000 feet. It will resume in May.

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
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One of the representative organizations of Morris, and one in which every citizen takes an unusual amount of pride, is the fire department. While the department is small numerically, it is a strong institution financially.

The department was organized Nov. 25, 1890, with a membership of twenty, which was later increased to twenty-six. The apparatus consists of

a Watrous steam fire engine, more than 2,000 feet of hose, a ladder truck, ladders, hose cart and other equipment. The funds in the treasury will be used in the purchase of apparatus and the erection of a new engine-house.

The Morris Fire Company Relief association, organized under the state law, April 20, 1897, to run for thirty years, has more than \$1,000 in the treasury, secured from state aid.

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ANNUAL ELECTION FOR GOVERNOR

TOWNS AND VILLAGES.

Cambridge, Fertile, Hawley and Evansville Among Towns to Adhere to the No-License System—License Fee to Receive a Notch at Owatonna and Montevideo—List of New Officers.

The question of liquor license was chief, as usual, in many Minnesota villages. It was held there annual elections yesterday. Only the comparative few, among them Cambridge, Battle Lake, Fertile, Twin Valley, Hawley and Evansville, declared for no license. Results in several other points, however, indicate an increase in the license fee.

Among towns which declared for license are Luverne, Benson, Madelia, Spring Valley, Owatonna, Le Roy, Pelican Rapids, Blooming Prairie, Rendell, Appleton, West Concord, Kenyon, Montevideo, Winnebago City, Frazee, Cokato, Brownsdale, Atwater, Heron, Shiloh and Elk River.

The results of the elections are as follows:
