REMEMBER THE MONITOR

SWEDISH CITIZENS HOLD BANQUET ON ANNIVERSARY OF VICTORY BY THEIR COUNTRYMAN'S INVENTION.

Representative Swedish citizens from all parts of the state were present at the banquet given last evening, at the Nicollet house, by the Swedish-American Republican League, to commemorate the forty-second anniversary of the victory of the dauntless little Monitor. President P. H. Stolberg of Harris had his toast list badly mangled thru the inability of the speaker Van Sant and other invited guests to attend, but was fortunate in his selection of substitutes, and the affair proved an entire success.

Senator A. O. Eberhardt of Mankato, in responding to "The Office-seeker in Politics," took occasion to remark that it was significant that altho there were thousands of republican voters among the Swedish-Americans in the twin cities there were very few representatives in the legislature. This was because the Swedes were not office-seekers. They should be, however, for it was good citizenship to wish to serve the public. No office sought the man, except the office of road overseer, and no public work was more poorly done than the road work.

WANT FIREPROOF SCHOOL

Board of Control Would Cut Off Fire Menace at Owatonna.

The state board of control desires to restore the state school building at Owatonna as a fireproof building. The amount received from the insurance, \$28,000, is sufficient to rebuild it in the former style, but to make it fireproof will require \$8,000 to \$10,000 more. The law authorizes an appropriation from the general fund to reconstruct a state building in case of emergency, the case to be decided by the governor, auditor, treasurer and attorney general. The question troubling the board is whether the occasion can be called an emergency.

REAL ESTATE MEN HELP

Will Aid in Canvass for Insurance for Auditorium.

The Minneapolis Real Estate board at its meeting yesterday agreed to co-operate with the Commercial club in securing a good auditorium for Minneapolis. The members will take part in the canvass for insurance. E. S. Smith, the secretary, said yesterday that the improvement of a \$100,000 lot by a \$150,000 building would certainly add materially to the value of land within a wide radius and would give an impetus to business in general.


