Wear Raiment That Is Fearful and Wonderful, but Promise to Make Good on the Diamond—Plenty of Seasoned Material—Varsity Basketball Girls' Team vs. Freshmen.

A visit to Coach Ferguson's baseball gymnasium, in session every afternoon in the university armory, leaves an impression strongly resembling that produced by comic opera. Nowhere else save in the burlesque chorus can one see raiment so brilliant in color and so rich in contrast as that displayed by the candidates for the varsity. Nearly every form of varsity emblem is in evidence, and the freshmen are clad in "prep" school suits, which rival the dandelion and the tiger lily.

This display is more than pleasing to the eye; it is a sign of encouragement. It means that the men on the squad have played the game before and have made good. When the first call for candidates was answered, the varsity manager, Leach, would have to hold down the receiving end of the battery alone, and doleful prophecies were made as to what would happen if Leach were flung out of the game. Two good men, Thorton and Slade, are now at work with the big mitt and promise to give Leach not only a good pair of substitutes, but a couple of dangerous rivals as well.

Gleason and Wheaton, two sophomores who pitched for the academic team last year, and Neuman and Brown, freshmen, are out for places on the pitching staff. Hamers and Brigham, both varsity men, are trying curves and in-shoots in the cage, and Rogers will take a turn on the slab if his arm keeps in good condition.

The freshmen were anxious to try their strength against the regulars, and were confident of victory, as several members of the varsity had been on the defeated teams.

CHICAGO COACH PROFESSES IGNORANCE OF PROJECT FOR FOOTBALL GAME WITH MINNESOTA.

TERRY PICKS CORBETT

THINKS DENVER BOY WILL WIN IN HIS FIGHT WITH JIMMY BRITT.

Newark, N. J., March 16.—"Young Corbett will take Jimmy Britt in their fight at Frisco next week," said Terry McGovern last night. "Rounds? Well, that would be merely guess work and I don't want to go on record for that. Britt is a great little fighter, the same as Corbett, and who can state reliably whether the bout will last one or twenty rounds? There are three reasons why I believe Corbett will win, but at the same time, the fight appears to be so even that should anyone venture to offer 2 to 1 on either man, I will take the short end with \$2,500, be it Corbett or Britt. "Britt will have to give away several pounds to get down to weight, 130 pounds and that I believe, will weaken

him in a way that will count much in Corbett's favor." Then again, Corbett has the punch, while Britt is not noted for "scoring" knockouts. But third, Corbett has a method which does more toward beating a man, than any of the Denver boys' famous hooks or uppercuts. That method is abusing his opponent with taunting and even vile language, which generally riles a fellow to a boiling point and his opponent in his anger gets off his guard, leaving to his credit and Corbett's willings in his knockout. Britt, I know, is a hot headed fellow, and when once driven to madness will either pummel the other to his credit, or be knocked out, or temporarily lose his science and meet the same fate as others. Corbett being as cool as a cucumber at all stages, the result will probably be in his favor."
