CITY NEWS.

OPPOSE REPEAL OF CURFEW LAW

EDUCATORS AND CLERGYMEN WOULD RETAIN THE MEASURE.

Chief of Police Conroy Also Approves—Agitation to Repeal the Ordinance Spurs Up Many to Call for Its Enforcement—W. C. T. U. Greatly Interested.

The proposed repeal of the curfew ordinance may have an effect different from the one intended. There is a prospect that new life will be infused into the ordinance as a result of the agitation.

A rather wide inquiry among persons who deal largely with children, and among ministers and others interested in the welfare of young people, shows that none approves the repeal of the ordinance, although many are opposed to permitting ineffective laws to remain on the books. They call for an effort to enforce the ordinance instead of its repeal. No fault is found with the law, and it is claimed that it has proved in the months soon after its passage that it could be enforced with good effect.

It is generally agreed that the law has become a dead letter, but Chief Conroy favors enforcing the ordinance and will welcome an agitation that will afford him support, as without public co-operation little can be done. Dr. C. M. Jordan, superintendent of schools, helped to secure the passage of the ordinance, and still approves of it. He does not approve of dead letter laws, nor laws that public sentiment does not support, but he does not believe that the curfew law falls necessarily into that class, and he hopes to see renewed efforts to enforce the law, instead of its repeal.

The W. C. T. U. wants largely instrumental in securing the passage of the ordinance, and, although no concerted action has yet been taken, several prominent workers are preparing to bring the matter before the unions and to send in individual protests, as well as to ask other reform agencies to give the matter attention.


Many believe that, even without police enforcement, the curfew bell and the regulations for which it stands have had and still have to some extent a positive moral force. Every ringing of the bell is a reminder to the children that they should be at home, and the force of this warning is not altogether lost. It is the opinion of D. H. Painter, principal of the Adams school, that the children have learned to respect the hour and that parents make it an issue in the family.

Dr. L. H. Hallock of Plymouth church said: "I am much afraid that the ordinance is dead, and I don't believe in dead laws, but I should dislike to see a backward step such as the repeal would be, for I think the sentiment of the people favors the spirit of the ordinance, properly enforced. What is needed is enforcement, not repeal."

Dr. S. D. Huttsinpiiler thought the existence of the law had an educational value and was a reminder to the police of their duty in dealing with flagrant cases. He believed that proper suggestion would stimulate enforcement of the ordinance. The plan of the law he approved, as it is the duty of the public to supplement the home when the observance of the higher law of the home is neglected. The well-regulated family would never feel the force of such a regulation, and the ill-regulated one should.

HEAVY WORK ALL DONE

Work of Rejuvenating the Federal Building Nearly Completed.

"Odds and ends" summarizes the remaining work in rejuvenating the federal building. All of the heavy work is done, but it will be several weeks before the repairs are really completed. The outside stone work has yet to be cleaned, but this will not interfere with use of the building. Painting also must be done, but it will take but a short time. It is not thought that the penalty of \$50 a day will be exacted for the work done after to-day, as it will not disturb the routine of the department. It will probably be well into June before the building is entirely finished. Postmaster Hale and Assistant Postmaster Hughes will not move upstairs for a week or ten days, and this will delay some of the moving plans on the lower floor.

SALE OF DITCHING JOBS.
