TRUSTS. We believe that the large corporations controlled by trusts should be regulated by laws and supervised both in their organization and operation that their evil tendencies may be checked and their evil propensities removed, and that the public shall be so regulated and controlled as to prevent monopoly and promote competition and in the fullest measure subserve and advance the public good.

PENSION LAWS. The veterans of the Union armies deserve and should receive the best treatment and generous recognition, and they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the present and the best that can be calculated to secure the fulfillment of the pledges made to them in the dark days of the country's peril.

We hold in the highest appreciation and express anew our confidence in the distinguished character and high character and invaluable public services of both United States Senators Knute Nelson and Mosses E. Clapp, and insist that during their tenure on this state and nation, and resolve that it is the sense and choice of this convention that they both succeed themselves in the office of United States senator when their respective terms expire.

CONGRESSIONAL. The republican party of Minnesota endorses the conduct of its republican representatives in congress and is proud of the ability shown and the conspicuous part played in shaping legislation and bringing added glory and honor to the state they so ably represent.

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DEMOCRATS SPLIT OVER CANDIDATES

Party Leaders See No Hope of Defeating Roosevelt.

Hearst and Cleveland Favored by Opposing Factions—Bryan Acting with Editor, Who Appears on Good Terms with Tom Johnson of Ohio—Appeals to Proletariat.

New York Sun Special Service. Chicago, March 17.—A Washington special to the Tribune says: There are many hearted hearts of blue in the democratic cloakroom of the party.

They explain the situation by declaring that Bryan and the anti-Bryan forces are as much at odds today as they were four years ago, while it is admitted the republicans are acting in entire harmony.

The wings of the democratic party ultimately will be concentrated on William R. Hearst, and Grover Cleveland.

It is well understood that Bryan and Hearst are acting in harmony, and it seems likely that Hearst and Tom Johnson are on similarly good terms in this.

The New York editor's appeals have been largely, if not entirely, to the proletariat, and this was the element to which Mr. Brown appealed most successfully.

There is a sentiment among the southern men that the only way in which they can emphasize their opposition to Bryan is to vote for Tom Johnson to turn back as far as possible, which they construe to mean the support of Grover Cleveland.

FAIRBANKS AS CANDIDATE. Senator Is Not Seeking Nomination but Won't Decline.

Control in Hill's Hands. The pro rata method will land the control of Great Northern and of Northern Pacific in the hands of Mr. Hill and his friends, who hold over 50 per cent of Northern Securities.

Well, I've still got the roads, haven't I? This is what he means. The difference is that the company was organized the first time in the middle of the biggest boom in history.

Had the company not become entangled, the securities of the company would probably be scattered far and wide ahead of it in the race of capital, the task is not so easy.

Undusted Securities. Messrs Morgan, Hill, Harriman, etc., have on their hands a fearful load of what the first named gentleman calls "undusted securities."

Mr. Hill is not so fortunate. It is true that he sold \$15,000,000 of his stock at about \$115 per share, and it is equally true that he has bought back at least as much since at below 90.

Mr. Hill and his immediate friends can tell just how much has been gathered in from England, Holland and America in such transactions, so no one can guess with just what patience Mr. Hill and his friends will bear the load.

What Wall street does know is that Mr. Hill and his friends have it, and are probably well able to carry it until the public gets the world at large begins to fancy the securities—whether they are Great Northern, Northern Pacific or the stocks of other companies.

THE HISTORY OF THE STANDARD OIL TRUST will well remember in this connection. This trust was declared an outlay, illegal, and totally unfit to live by the supreme court. It made the mason and the bricklayers, under the pro rata plan, and went out of existence.

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COAL MINERS ARE AGAINST STRIKE

Unofficial Returns of Local Voters Show Majority Accept Operators' Scale.

Indianapolis, March 17.—The count of the miners' vote on the acceptance or rejection of the two years' scale today.

About 2,500 locals have voted. The full unofficial returns indicate that of 139,000 miners 87,000 voted to accept the operators' proposition and 52,000 voted in favor of a strike.
