TALKS TO BUSINESS MEN

Washington, March 22.—The postmaster general has started a crusade against publishers of obscene and indecent advertisements. General Payne hopes to purify these publications by barring them from the mails. The warfare will be particularly extended to include the circulation of advertisements to print objectionable worded advertisements. It is believed that as soon as the offending papers are ordered to discontinue their circulation, they will be forced to handle this class of advertising matter.

The prosecutions recommended by Postmaster Payne are under the obscene literature act. For many years this has been the standard. It has only been since the reorganization of the post-office department, growing out of the graft revelations, that this crusade was undertaken. It was started by some of the new blood that was brought into the department at that time.

MAY START SAFE FACTORY HERE

WAUGH COMPANY CONSIDERS TAKING UP MANUFACTURING. Will Have the Only Plant of the Kind West of Cincinnati—Minneapolis Has an Ideal Location for Safe-Distributing Center—Co-operation of Business Men Enlisted.

Safes and bank vaults may be manufactured in Minneapolis. The factory will be the only one west of Cincinnati. That city now has a monopoly of the safe manufacturing business. Minneapolis is just the point for a safe distributing center, and it is cheaper to haul the rough material here and turn it into safes than to ship the manufactured product from the east.

The L. B. Waugh company is considering reorganizing as a manufacturing as well as a sales company. In this reorganization the co-operation of business men has been sought, and it is understood that the Commercial club has been investigating the project through its public affairs committee, with the idea of inducing the company's factory plan. Good progress has been made and the venture is in a fair way of realization.

Besides making a long list of diversified manufactures which Minneapolis boasts today, the firm promises to become a city company, which will employ a large force of men.
