SCHUMANN-HEINK RECITAL

The name of Schumann-Heink is the synonym of success. She is a marvel of achievement, a superb example of what genius, brains and an indomitable perseverance can accomplish. By her own efforts she has reached the pinnacle of fame. As a woman, gracious and wholesome; as a mother, loving and faithful; as a wife, tender and solicitous; as an artist, of consummate power and skill; she challenges the admiration and affection of mankind. It is no wonder, then, that at her recital at the First Baptist church last evening every seat was taken and the walls lined in places three-deep with eager listeners. There were no captious critics. Every listener was self-pledged to do honor to the prima donna.

The program opened with an aria from "Mitrane" by Rossi, an exceedingly difficult thing that taxed the artistic powers of the singer. Her voice unfortunately

was not at its best. The strain of her present tour, as well, possibly, as a temporary indisposition showed in her voice and not even her art could conceal their effects. "My Heart at Thy Dear Voice," the famous Saint Saens aria, was surprisingly well sung under the hampering conditions. Rarely has her passion and subtle treasury revealed such a dramatic and all-satisfying interpretation.

The "Rienzi" recitative and aria were sung still better, but it remained for the closing group of songs to bring out the singer's full powers. Schubert's "Death and the Maiden" was powerfully effective, and Liszt's "The Three Gypsies," displayed her wonderful range of voice, and versatility of art. It was, however, in the Hugo Wolf "Heimweh" that the climax of the evening was reached. Wolf was a young German whose God-given genius was too powerful. His life paid the penalty, and the asylum opened its portals to him before the end came. To-day there is scarcely a song program given in Germany that does not contain one or more of his songs. The "Heimweh" is the brightest jewel of them all, and the tender pathos that dominates all the Wolf lieder, finds its culminating note in this song. Schumann-Heink sang it divinely. The great song and the great singer were wedded and the spontaneous ovation it received showed the appreciation of the vast audience.

Josephine Hartmann accompanied the prima donna but indifferently well, and in her first solo number, the Chopin Fantasia in F minor was scarcely convincing. In the Hungarian Rhapsody, the inevitable twelfth by the way, Miss Hartmann was much better and her execution was very creditable; this was especially true of her runs and trills, and her interpretation was intelligent and satisfactory.

Last night Schumann-Heink was here. To-night her successor was the Frau forces, Olive Fremstad, will be heard.
