Uncorroborated testimony given by Miles Reeves an ex-convict, was held by Judge Dickinson in police court this morning, to be insufficient for the conviction of John Ewald and Louis Wiley, charged with conducting a gambling-house at 48 Fourth street S, and further called forth this statement from the court:

"Notions of this court for its officers can be used as a tool for wringing money from others, by this man Miles Reeves or any of his sort. The evidence plainly shows that the recent arrests on his warrants were made for the purpose of gaining money. This was further shown by Reeves' offering to leave the city and stop the prosecution for a certain sum. If it were in my power I would have him arrested for contempt of court. However, this court will not do that, but will take evidence against these gambling places from victims or others who can give truthful testimony on the stand."
