**PLAGUE RAVAGES INDIA**  
Mortality of 40,000 Weekly Is Shown by Death Rolls.

Bombay, March 29.—The latest available bubonic plague returns for the week ending March 19 show the appalling mortality of 40,537, an increase of 7,000 over those of the preceding week. In the Punjab and each of the northwest provinces the death rolls are 10,000 weekly; in the Bombay presidency the deaths number 8,500, and in Bengal 6,000.

## FRANCE TO HAVE STATE SCHOOLS

French Chamber Passes Bill for Suppressing Religious Teaching Orders.

Paris, March 29.—Premier Combes has secured the passage in the chamber of deputies, by a vote of 218 to 269, of the bill forbidding all forms of teaching by religious orders. No opposition is expected in the senate.

The bill provides for the suppression within ten years of all orders authorized to teach. It does not apply to the colonies, but the law of 1901 gives the government power by decree to close colonial schools taught by religious orders.

Existing congregations are prohibited from recruiting new members and only novitiates destined for training teachers for the colonies may remain. Severe penalties are prescribed.

Property of authorized congregations is to remain untouched until the closing of their last school. After pensioning the survivors and returning conditional gifts, liquidators are to apply surplus funds to secular education.

**POPE RESENTS ACTION**  
Encyclical Will Express Hostility to French Government.

Rome, March 29.—Pope Pius is preparing an encyclical to the French episcopate and clergy which will probably widen the France-Vatican breach.

Cardinal Merry Del Val says that the encyclical is so outspoken that no compromise will be possible unless the Combes ministry should fall.

## MORALES ROUTS JIMINEZ

PRESIDENT OF SAN DOMINGO HAS INSURGENT GENERAL BOTTLED UP.

San Juan, P. R., March 29.—Official dispatches from the seat of war and private letters give accounts of fierce and bloody encounters recently between the revolutionists and troops of President Morales of San Domingo. With few exceptions, the latter have been victorious.

General Jiminez, routed, without arms, property or money, is now shut up in Monte Cristi.

Insurgents only hold three towns—Monte Cristi on the northern coast, and Samana and San Juan on the south. Many of the revolutionary troops have formed small robber bands. A few days ago several valuable buildings near the city of San Domingo were burned.

## P. R. TEACHERS COMING

SIX HUNDRED WANT ASSISTANCE TO ATTEND SUMMER SCHOOLS IN THE U. S.

San Juan, P. R., March 29.—Dr. Samuel M. Lindsay, commissioner of education for Porto Rico, is on his way to New York, Philadelphia and Washington in the interest of 600 Porto Rican teachers who wish to visit the United States in July for education in summer schools.

Dr. Lindsay will discuss the details with President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft, the president having promised the use of an army transport to carry the teachers without expense except for meals.

School teachers' wages in Porto Rico are very low, ranging from \$30 to \$75 a month.

The cost of the trip will be about \$60,000, and Commissioner Lindsay hopes to get financial assistance from public spirited citizens of the United States.

## ALL TRAINS GET THRU

NORTH COAST LIMITED, BLOCKADED THREE DAYS AND THREE NIGHTS, REACHES BILLINGS.

Billings, Mont., March 29.—The snow blockade in North Dakota has been broken, and Northern Pacific thru trains have begun to arrive from the east.

At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the North Coast limited, which was due here Friday forenoon, arrived. It headed the line of west-bound blockaded trains and laid at Richardson three days and nights. Richardson is twenty-five miles east of Dickinson, which appears to have been the storm center.

Passengers on the train said they were comfortably provided for by the railroad company. The blizzard was a terrific one, and until Saturday the passengers were unable to leave the cars. The cuts along the road were full of snow, and the engines that were caught were completely covered. The crust was so hard that men walked from one engine to another upon it.

Four other delayed trains arrived here before midnight, and behind them came a special train carrying President Elliott. This train had also been in the blockade since Thursday night.

## AGEN THE NOMINEE

Long Deadlock in Republican Convention at Superior Broken.

Superior, Wis., March 29.—After balloting all day, the republican city convention nominated James H. Agen for mayor on the 12th formal ballot.

The nomination was made as the result of a combination of the Agen and Victor Linley forces. Linley withdrawing. If the deadlock had continued four hours more there would have been no republican city ticket. Parker held his vote to the finish, but there was a belief that enough of his men would have gone to Agen to nominate him had not the Linley forces acted first.

Gus Johnson was named for controller and R. H. Hunter for treasurer.
