GOUNOD'S "REDEMPTION"

Gounod's "Redemption" was given a rendition last evening at the Calvary Baptist church by the Calvary Singing club, consisting of forty-eight members, under the sole direction of Mrs. Harry W. Jones. Its work last night reflected great credit, not only upon the director, but upon the members themselves. The work calls for a large and experienced chorus and was an exceedingly ambitious thing for so small a church club to undertake, yet the choral numbers were among the best things in the entire oratorio. The choruses are put in the main such as call for a spirited rendition, but they were given with a breadth of treatment and volume of tone that was thoroughly satisfying. Indeed, for so small a chorus, the results secured were unusually good.

The assisting soloists were Maud Ulmer Jones, soprano; D. Alvin Davies, tenor; W. Scott Woodworth, baritone, and George P. Walker, bass. Mrs. Jones was cordially received, although not in the best of voice. Mr. Davies gave a somewhat colorless and ineffective reading, and the same might be said, although in a lesser degree, of Mr. Woodworth. Mr. Walker has a voice of unusual power and compass, but there is an uncertainty as to pitch and a vibrato that is aggravating to the listener. Miss Eleanor Nesbitt sang the solo, "While My

Watch I Am Keeping," with a beautiful, sweet voice of good timbre. With Misses Agnes Griswold and MaBelle Day, among the trios allotted to "The Holy Women." They were very sweet and beautiful.

The orchestra of sixteen pieces, assisted by Miss Margaret Gilmore at the piano and Carlyle M. Scott at the organ, furnished the accompaniment. The orchestral work was not as good as it might have been, some of the instruments being at times out of tune and the entire orchestra sadly showing the need of rehearsal.

The beautiful auditorium of the new Calvary church was completely filled, some late comers being obliged to stand. There were many musicians in the audience.
