FIGHT SEVERAL LICENSES

Home Protective League Will Appear Before Council Committee.

Officers of the Home Protective league are to appear before the license committee of the city council on Friday night. The meeting may prove highly interesting. At the last meeting the members of the league made no protest on the issuance of a number of licenses, with the understanding that the saloonmen who were allowed to continue in business and receive licenses at that time would do away with anything having the semblance of wineries.

It is said that some of those favored have not "played fair" with the league, and this may result in the latter organization making strong representations looking toward the revoking of licenses. Evidence gathered in connection with other saloonkeepers whose applications will come up Friday night will be submitted. From surface indications the Friday night meeting may take on more than pink-tea proportions before the evening is ended.

NATIONAL GUARD OUTING

Trip to St. Louis Will Cost \$90,000—May Be Given Up.

Statisticians have estimated that it will cost \$90,000 for the Minnesota national guard to go to St. Louis this year instead of going into camp at Lakewood. This sum taken for the junket would deplete the funds of the guard to such an extent that there would be nothing remaining to pay for camp expenses in 1905. There is a desire on the part of some of the militia men to go to St. Louis, but the officers hold that the men would not gain anything in the way of instruction in drill and camp work and point out that the fund is more or less of an educational one in the line of schooling soldiers. The matter will be laid to Governor Van Sant and will be decided on the return of the executive from Iowa.

APRIL TERM NEARS END

Last Jury Cases Now Under Way in the Federal Court.

Federal court for the April term will close by to-morrow night. This morning Judge Morris listened to the evidence in the Overacker damage suit against the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, while Judge Lochner took up the suit of A. W. Rankin against the St. Paul and Western Coal company. Rankin seeks to recover \$4,000 from the corporation as a result of damages received in a collision between a runaway team belonging to the coal company and Rankin's buggy.

These actions are the last jury trials of the term, and all petty jurors not held for the cases in hand were discharged this morning. Several motions will be made before the judges following the close of the jury trials.

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WHEAT CROP IS NOT PROMISING

H. V. JONES SO REPORTS AFTER SOUTHWESTERN INSPECTION.

Grave Danger Threatens Winter Wheat Unless Rains Come Within a Month—He Estimates Country's Product at 600,000,000 From Present Conditions, Which Are Subject to Change.

H. V. Jones returned this morning from a tour of the southwest and inspection of the winter wheat fields. Mr. Jones finds a condition warranting fear for the crop unless good rains come within a month. The winter wheat promise is not high at best, there being many very dry places in Kansas, Texas and Oklahoma, where the wheat after appearing above ground has made little further growth. Much of the area stands in position where the weather for the next two weeks will tell the story for a considerable area.

Reviewing the situation, Mr. Jones says: "The wheat crop of the United States is in more critical condition than for several seasons. The sections of the southwest have not had rains for ten months, notably the Texas panhandle and western Oklahoma. The whole wheat area of the Ohio valley, however, is well watered in some degree unfavorably, and rains will be necessary to bring out a good crop.

Area Likely to Be Lost.

"If these rains are not general by May 10, a considerable part of the wheat area will be lost regardless of what conditions may obtain afterward. Kansas had some good rains last night, which will be very helpful. I feel that we have no right to discount the future too much, hence should say the chances are for a good crop. Kansas, Texas and Oklahoma together will this year raise as much as 600,000,000 bushels more.

"The trouble with the crop is that it lacks growth and staying quality, due to the long drought. It has come up well all over Kansas, and over part of Oklahoma and central Texas, but it has no growth, being perhaps two inches high, while at this date, as we express it, for average appearance, it should be tall enough to hide a rabbit.

"Central Missouri will disappoint, and western Oklahoma will do well to get back seed. Central Texas and the northern part of central Oklahoma show good promise. Kay county, Oklahoma, has the banner prospect.

Country's Product Estimated.

"Taking a general view of the United States and going as far as warranted by conditions of chances at this time, I should place the country's production at 600,000,000 bushels. Without the rains suggested above the yield will be likely to fall considerably under, and with good rains is not likely to exceed it much.

"Were it not for a good gain on the Pacific coast, the country would show a heavy falling off from last year.

Stocks May Be Affected.

"A serious phase of the crop situation is the unfavorable effect that a poor wheat crop would have on stock values. The shortage in the tonnage of grain would not in itself be serious, but such shortage would affect purchases of merchandise materially, and this in turn would affect railroad tonnage materially."

INSPECT FILTER PLANTS IN EAST

Pure Water Commission Invited to Take a Junket in Search of Ideas.

Allen Hazen, the well known water supply expert of the city and chairman of the Minneapolis Pure Water commission, has suggested that the local members of the committee meet in New York city about April 23, and that the commission visit some of the latest filter plants in the east, particularly the one at New York. The plant is now being built according to the most advanced ideas. Later on he will meet with the members of the commission.

Andrew Rinker and F. W. Cappelen, the local members of the commission had an informal talk over the suggestion made by Mr. Hazen. They will confer with the waterworks committee before mapping out any definite course.

DOG AND BICYCLE TAGS FOR 1904 WILL BE ON SALE NEXT WEEK.

Dog licenses and bicycle tags may be secured for the coming year at the office next week. The dog licenses will be placed on sale next Monday. The bicycle tags may be delayed a day or two. Fred Gutman will be in charge of the licenses.

Neither class of licenses is due until May 1, but in order to prevent a crush on that date, City Clerk Lydian will open the sale a week in advance. Bicycle Inspector Lofstedt is ready to begin his campaign on the cycle park. The first of next month but the dog catcher's van will probably not be started for a while.

ANOTHER BEAUTY OF THE GEM OF THE ANTILLES POINTED OUT BY C. N. CHADBOURN.

"Havana appears to be a clean city with no objectionable sights or smells," says C. N. Chadbourn, who has just returned to Minneapolis after a pleasure tour of the south which was extended to Cuba. "The first thing I noticed was the almost entire absence of flies which had made life miserable in Florida.

"There seems to be a general impression among travelers that the conditions of government in Cuba are not very stable and that Uncle Sam may have to go down there again and straighten them out. Vast sums of American money are pouring into Cuba for investment and for this reason our government will probably keep a sharp eye on affairs to see that our citizens' interests do not suffer.

"One met several politicians in Cuba. Fallis Linton is buying Cuban lands with the idea of improving them and selling again. M. W. Yerxa has realized handsomely on some investments and Havana is coming to be the winter headquarters for a number of people from the twin cities.

"The hotels are bad. They are all in the hands of the Cubans. They charge high prices and one gets little in return. I understand that there are other reasons there will be an American house, a thoroughly modern hotel, built in Havana and I think it will prove a popular house.

"The harbor at Havana, just as it was the day after it was destroyed. There are many stories current as to the reasons but none would appear to be at all satisfactory. Mrs. Chadbourn accompanied me on the southern trip and to Cuba. She is now in Chicago and will not return for several weeks."
