CITY NEWS.

LITHO STRIKE IS NOW ENDED

MINNEAPOLIS MEN WILL RETURN TO WORK TO-MORROW.

They Have Been Out Five Weeks While the National Agreement Between Employers and Journeymen Was Being Put on a More Satisfactory Basis.

Minneapolis lithographing establishments will open up for business tomorrow after a shut down of five weeks. The trouble grew out of the attempt to formulate a working agreement for the coming year and unions and employers throught the country differed as to the terms of arbitration. The shops were closed in every city and what appeared to be a stubborn game of waiting was on. After the matter had progressed for about two weeks the Civic Federation of New York offered its services as a mediator.

Conferences lasting ten days between employers and employees resulted in an agreement which was tentatively agreed to last week ago a tentative agreement was reached. This was to be ratified by the subordinate unions and the employers' association. Ratification has been delayed but the returns are all in. Work will be resumed to-morrow.

For some unexplained reason the Twin City union was among the last to ratify, the action being taken this afternoon. The trouble came at a time of the year when the employers were not rushed by business.

In making the settlement both sides granted concessions from the stands originally taken.

WATER MUST BE FILTERED

Dr. H. M. Bracken Says That is the Only Way.

Filtration is necessary to assure Minneapolis pure water, according to Dr. H. M. Bracken, secretary of the state board of health. In an address delivered last night under the auspices of the improvement league at Drummond hall, he said:

"Sometimes typhoid fever is contracted from vegetables, fruit, milk and other things, but in all cases the germs originate in water, as the bacilli belong to the vegetable kingdom and flourish in this element."

He held that it was absolutely impossible to obtain pure water in a thickly settled city without filtration. He branded as useless all suggested plans for obtaining city water from lakes, wells or any other source without first filtering it. He cited statistics from other cities showing death rates and causes.

There were 29,600 cases of typhoid fever in Minnesota in the past three years and of these 1,100 resulted in death. This is so far in advance of the average death rate from the disease to constitute an epidemic and the blame was laid wholly upon bad water. Two years were fixed as the length of time necessary to establish a filtering plant, and in closing the speaker warned his hearers not to depend upon small individual filters. He held that while they assisted in cleansing the water they did not make it safe. Thoro boiling of the water was urged.




